


As we head into the holiday season, the Putnam County Historian's Office has curated a gift guide celebrating local history and supporting our historical societies, non-profits, and museums. Inside, you'll find unique gifts ranging from books and tote bags to bracelets, mugs, and—perhaps most important—membership packages that help sustain these organizations in their mission to preserve Putnam County's rich past.



### Putnam County Historian's Office

The Putnam County Historian's Office is proud to republish *Willitt C. Jewell's Putnam County*—originally written during World War II and first printed in 1946 within Southeastern New York. This new edition features an introduction, updated annotations, and more than 200 additional photographs, maps, and archival materials drawn from the Jewell Collections and local historical repositories.

Building on William S. Pelletreau's 1886 county history, Jewell chronicles Putnam County from the early 20th century through World War II. He explores emerging technologies, the development of local institutions and industries, the rise of summer-home communities, and provides an unparalleled account of the home front during WWII. Notably, this was the first published county history to include the story of Sybil Ludington's ride. (\$30, plus S&H)



"Insider" guided Historic House Museum tours are available for guests to experience Boscobel during its ongoing restoration. Call ahead or visit boscobel.org to book.





#### Town of Carmel Historical Society

Drawing from the archives of the Carmel Historical Society, the Putnam County Historian's Office, and private collections, *Mahopac* offers a vivid look at the town's evolving identity and enduring place in New York's history.

Expertly written and published in 2012 by Town of Carmel Historical Society members Eugene Boesch, the late Gregory J. Amato, and Barbara Lachina Bosch, this work covers the early settlement around Lake Mahopac and stresses its role in the American Revolution. The hamlet grew into a regional producer of farm goods before transforming into a popular vacation destination known for its grand hotels, boardinghouses, and scenic lakes. The arrival of the railroad in 1872 made Mahopac an easy escape for New Yorkers seeking fresh air and recreation.

#### Constitution Island Association


Constitution Island and the Warner House were gifted to the United States on September 4, 1908, to become part of the U.S. Military Academy's reservation at West Point. Although administered by West Point, the island is geographically part of Putnam County, New York. For decades prior, the island had been home to sisters Anna and Susan Warner—celebrated 19th-century authors whose works were widely read in their time.

To preserve their legacy, the Martelear's Rock Association was founded in 1916 to protect the Warner House and safeguard the family's furnishings, books, and historic objects. In 1925, it was succeeded by the Constitution Island Association, chartered by the New York State Board of Regents.

Today, the Association continues its mission to preserve the Warner collections, honor the island's history and residents, protect Constitution Island, and educate the public about its unique heritage. Since 1916, it has worked closely with the U.S. Military Academy and the U.S. Army Garrison at West Point to provide meaningful educational and recreational opportunities while celebrating the island's historic, literary, and cultural significance.



One of the most widely read American novels of the nineteenth-century, *The Wide, Wide World* established Susan Warner as the nation's preeminent sentimental novelist.



Bearing Warner's pseudonym Elizabeth Wetherell, the novel traces the maturation of a young girl, Ellen Montgomery, from childhood to adolescence. Though generally valued less for its literary merit than for its historical significance, the work is considered one of the earliest examples of the domestic novel—a genre focused on the lives of ordinary women that became extremely fashionable after 1850.


#### Own a Piece of History

In 1778, midway through the Revolutionary War, American colonists forged an enormous iron chain and stretched it across the Hudson River from West Point to Constitution Island. For five years, this 80-ton "Great Chain" successfully prevented British warships from advancing, protecting the communities of the upper Hudson Valley.

To honor this remarkable achievement, the Constitution Island Association commissioned an exclusive New York City jeweler to create a miniature Great Chain Bracelet. This 8.25" handcrafted piece can be made in sterling silver, 14k gold, or 18k gold. Each bracelet is individually numbered and includes a certificate of authenticity. (Size adjustments available.)



The Great Chain




#### Gardening by Myself:


#### Kent Historical Society












#### Landmarks Preservation Society of Southeast



Now on holiday sale! quintessential local history book, History of Putnam County, New York, first published and written by William S. Pelletreau in 1886, offered by Landmarks in a reprinted, handsome blue linen hardback book. It features over 780 pages of county history, biographies, portraits and illustrations, and an index of names and subjects. The book is available for \$25 (plus S&H) through the Landmarks Society, and a limited number are available from the County Historian's Office by ordering online (scan QR code) or inperson pick up.



"Landmarks" is an incorporated not-for-profit 501(c) (3) based in Brewster, NY, dedicated to restoring, maintaining, and preserving properties under their ownership. Since 1977, they've worked hard to maintain these heritage properties and preserve the cultural identity of Southeast. Their headquarters is located at 43 Oak Street, inside the 1850 Greek revival style residence of the founder of Brewster Village, Walter Brewster. They also own the Doansburg Schoolhouse as well as the 1794 "Old Southeast Church" on Route 22 which is used as a museum and is open to visitors upon request. Many of their properties are available for weddings or special events rental. New members welcome.


### Patterson Historical Society

TThe Patterson Historical Society collects, preserves, and shares materials related to the history of the Town of Patterson. The Society promotes awareness and a deeper public understanding of Patterson's rich heritage through various programs and public events.

The Society publishes *Vignettes of Patterson's Past*, a beautifully produced hardbound volume featuring maps, photographs, and engaging historical essays (\$35, including S&H). #### Putnam History Museum


The mission of the Putnam History Museum is to collect, preserve, interpret, and present the history of Putnam County, Philipstown, the West Point Foundry, and the Hudson Highlands. Through exhibitions, lectures, and history hikes, the Museum uses its resources to engage the community with the history of Putnam County, and to foster greater understanding of the role the region has played in the growth of our nation.






### Putnam Valley Historical Society

Historians Sallie and Wylie Sypher offer a fresh and engaging exploration of Putnam Valley's past—from its early days as homeland of the Wappingers to its twenty-first-century identity as a metropolitan suburb. They detail how landlord Beverley Robinson stole Wappinger land (only to lose his own), why Putnam Valley ultimately separated from Philipstown, and how generations of struggling farmers departed in large numbers. They also recount the remarkable tenure of Harry Silleck, who served as town supervisor for nearly fifty years.

The Syphers trace how successive waves of newcomers—first seasonal residents, then year-round settlers—helped revive the community's fortunes while introducing new challenges that continue to shape Putnam Valley's future.




#### Southeast Museum

## Town of Southeast


#### Southeast 1788–1988

This vibrant volume brings the rich history of the Town of Southeast to life. Edited by historian Suzanne Truran and former Town Supervisor John Dunford, it traces the community through its many bold eras.

Journey from Southeast's Colonial beginnings to its pioneering railroad years, and through stories of mining disasters, cattle drives, homegrown robber barons, the Borden factory, and the town's wildly entertaining circus days. The book highlights an extraordinary cast of local figures, including Revolutionary War spy Enoch Crosby, village founder Walter Brewster, circus impresario Seth B. Howes, the enigmatic Leatherman, Gilded Age financier Daniel Drew, and trailblazing journalist and suffragist Marjorie Addis, among many others.


