The meeting was called to order at 7:08 P.M. by Chairwoman Addonizio who led in the Pledge of Allegiance and the Legislative Prayer. Upon roll call, Legislators Montgomery, Gouldman, Nacerino, Albano, Jonke, Castellano, Sayegh, Sullivan and Chairwoman Addonzio were present. Also present was Legislative Counsel Firriolo.

PROTECTIVE SERVICES COMMITTEE (Chairman Jonke, Legislators Nacerino & Sullivan)

Item #6a – Approval/ Budgetary Amendment (20A072)/ Sheriff's Department/ Security at Board of Elections Polling Sites was next. Chairwoman Addonizio recognized Legislator Jonke, Chairman of the Protective Services Committee. On behalf of the members of the Committee, Legislators Nacerino and Sullivan, Legislator Jonke moved the following:

Item #6b – Approval/ Budgetary Amendment (20A073)/ Commissioner of Finance/ E911 Consolidation Project was next. On behalf of the members of the Protective Services Committee, Legislators Nacerino and Sullivan, Legislator Jonke moved the following:

Legislator Montgomery stated that we had lengthy discussions on this in the Audit & Administration Committee meeting and the Protective Services Committee meeting. She believed it was insane to move forward spending \$398,000 with no plan. She stated that Commissioner of Finance William Carlin was just on the line during the Audit meeting. When she questioned the funding amount not adding up correctly, Commissioner Carlin indicated that if anything was left it would be applied to hiring a consultant. However, this was not indicated in the backup material. She stated that this is a proposed purchase for a huge capital improvement project that was not discussed, voted on or proposed during the Capital Project Committee meeting. She stated that we are spending almost \$400,000 without a plan.

Legislator Jonke stated that Commissioner of Emergency Services Ken Clair outlined some details during the Audit & Administration Committee meeting. He stated that he trusted our experts in the County. He explained that during the Audit meeting Legislator Montgomery finished her comments by stating, "I don't know I'm not the expert." He believed that we needed to leave this to the experts.

Legislator Montgomery stated that Commissioner Clair and Captain James Babcock are very good at their jobs. However, they are not consultants for a project like this, they have never done a project like this and they are not the experts for a project like this.

Legislator Albano stated the he supported this, and he believed that we had enough information. He explained that the numbers can often change, and Commissioner Carlin provided an explanation of how this will all come together.

Legislator Sullivan explained how over the years Commissioner Clair, Captain Babcock, IT Director Thomas Lannon, and others from the Sheriff's Department have had many discussions about the details of this project and he believed they had a very good plan in place. He stated that he fully trusted their expertise and capabilities to get this done. He did not believe a consultant was necessary.

Legislator Nacerino stated that she is in favor of this consolidation and she echoed what Legislator Sullivan said. She stated that the task before us tonight is simply to approve or disapprove the consoles. She explained that the individuals discussing this project will keep the Legislature apprised as we proceed with the project. She stated that the project is not what is up for a vote tonight. She stated that we are voting on the consoles which is necessary operational equipment in order to move forward. She stated that this has been an effective and efficient plan for the safety and wellbeing of our residents.

Legislator Sayegh stated the numbers do add up to \$397,670 and according to Commissioner Carlin we round to whole numbers; which is actually a difference of \$330.00. She stated that she was comfortable with the math from Commissioner Carlin. She believed that it made sense to consolidate which allows for quicker response times for our first responders. She stated that she trusts our Emergency Services, Sheriff's Department and Emergency Responders to be the experts on the particulars. She stated that she was in favor of this transfer for the consoles.

Legislator Montgomery stated that her colleagues keep referring to a plan that she has not seen. She stated that it is not that she is not in favor of the consolidation; it could be great, but we do not know that.

Legislator Jonke called the question; seconded by Legislator Sullivan.

Chairwoman Addonizio believed that over the years there has been much discussion to consolidate our 911 Dispatch. She stated that the consolidation will reduce redundancies, increase efficiencies and public safety. She believed all stakeholders think this consolidation is favorable.

Item #6d – Approval/ Putnam County Policy for the Use of Automated License Plate Readers (ALPR) was next. On behalf of the members of the Protective Services Committee, Legislators Nacerino and Sullivan, Legislator Jonke moved the following:

Legislator Montgomery stated that based on what was discussed at the Protective meeting, she believed that her colleagues were in favor of this and in favor of the data being managed by agencies outside of the Sheriff's Department. She stated that the Retention Schedule is guided by the New York State Commissioner of Education. She believed that it left the County vulnerable to for profit companies accessing this data. There is nothing in the policy that prevents that from happening. She believed the data

should be held by law enforcement only. She stated that of 28 agencies polled across the State there may only be one (1) who has a policy because of the way their department is run. She stated that the data is always held by the Sheriff's Department in every county and now we are leaving ourselves wide open for this data to be shared.

Legislator Albano stated that he was in favor of moving this. He stated that the policy could always be refined in the future if we believe it is necessary.

Legislator Sayegh stated that this policy mirrors the policy proposed by the Sheriff's Department; with only a few exceptions. She stated that it allows for more transparency from the Sheriff's Department to the Legislature. She stated that she is in favor of our IT Department involved to protect the data so that others cannot have access.

Legislator Nacerino supported the policy. She stated that the policy issued by the Sheriff's Department is almost identical to the one (1) we are adopting this evening. She believed the language is a bit more stringent making it more precise and not open to interpretation. She did not believe other agencies would be sharing our information; it would be confined to our IT Department. She believed what was stated by Legislator Montgomery was misleading.

Legislator Sullivan stated that we want to get these ALPRs to Cold Spring and the Sheriff's Department so they can start using them. He explained that picking this policy apart was just delaying the usage of this important equipment. He explained that the Law Department, Legislature and Legislative Counsel have gone through this in great detail. He was comfortable with it and thought it was a very good policy. He stated that he wants to get the tools in law enforcement's hands which they have been asking for.

Legislator Sayegh read a section of the resolution. She stated that, if passed, it would save our County government thousands of dollars each year.

Chairwoman Addonizio believed this was a great initiative. It not only recycles and disposes leftover paint; it also implements a paint recovery program which creates new paint from the recycled paint.

RESOLUTION #242

APPROVAL/ MEMORIALIZATION RESOLUTION SUPPORTING PRODUCT STEWARDSHIP PROGRAM FOR UNUSED PAINT/ ASSEMBLY BILL #A.11245 & SENATE BILL #S.9106

WHEREAS, it is estimated that close to 4 million gallons of leftover paint are generated in New York each year, which would cost \$31 million for local government to properly manage; and

WHEREAS, management of leftover paint in New York results in a cost that typically represents 50% of municipal household hazardous waste budgets, although not all paint is properly managed; and

WHEREAS, a statewide paint stewardship program would mean that the paint industry would be responsible for collecting and managing leftover paint in New York; and

WHEREAS, the American Coatings Association, a trade association representing 95% of paint manufacturers from across the United States has created PaintCare, a non-profit program to manage the reuse, recycling and disposal of leftover paint; and

WHEREAS, the District of Columbia and eight other states, including Rhode Island, Connecticut, Vermont, and Maine have passed legislation implementing paint recovery programs managed by PaintCare, saving local municipalities \$69 million dollars while successfully recycling 17 million gallons of paint since 2010 as part of household hazardous waste collection programs; and

WHEREAS, in addition to reducing government costs, a paint stewardship program would continue adding green sector jobs to the over 200 already created across states with paint stewardship legislation, reduce waste and encourage the public to purchase the right amount of paint for a job; and

WHEREAS, the Putnam County Legislature wishes to express its support for a statewide paint collection system; now therefore be it

RESOLVED, that the Putnam County Legislature hereby urges New York State to enact Assembly Bill A.11245 & Senate Bill S.9106 to relieve municipalities and taxpayers from the financial burden of collecting and managing leftover paint in New York; and be it further

RESOLVED, that the Clerk of the Putnam County Legislature is hereby directed to forward a copy of this Resolution to Putnam County's representatives in the State Legislature as well as to the Governor and leadership of our State Legislature.

RESOLUTION #244

APPROVAL/ LOCAL LAW TO AMEND THE CODE OF THE COUNTY OF PUTNAM CHAPTER 145, ENTITLED "ELECTRICIANS"

Be it enacted by the Legislature of the County of Putnam as follows:

Section I.

Section 145-19 of the Code of Putnam County is hereby amended to read as follows:

§ 145-19 Shelving of license.

Upon written request by any individual licensed under this chapter, a license may be shelved subject to the following:

A. Shelving of Master Electrician

- (1) Proof that any open electrical permit applications have been closed.
- (2) The granting of a request for shelved status shall not be deemed or otherwise considered a suspension of license.
- (3) Shelved status may be granted for a period of one year.
- (4) The period of shelved status shall commence upon expiration of the current year.
- (5) On or before December 31 of each year of shelved status, the licensee must submit a shelving affidavit.
- (6) A fee shall be assessed against the licensee during any period of approved shelved status.
- (7) Licensees can shelve in consecutive years for a maximum of five years without Board approval. If the licensee wishes to extend shelving beyond five years, the licensee must submit a letter to the Board providing a satisfactory reason for continued shelving.
- (8) A licensee granted shelved status must complete, prior to renewal, any applicable continuing education that may be required during the period of time the license is shelved.
- (9) Upon reactivation, the licensee shall be required to complete a renewal application and pay the appropriate annual licensing fee regardless of the time remaining in the calendar year.

(10) Any licensee of a shelved license found working in Putnam County shall be deemed unlicensed. He/she shall be subject to fines and penalties as provided for in this chapter.

B. Shelving of Electrical Journeyman

- (1) The granting of a request for shelved status shall not be deemed or otherwise considered a suspension of license.
- (2) Shelved status may be granted for a period of two years.
- (3) The period of shelved status shall commence upon expiration of the current two-year term.
- (4) On or before September 30 of the even-numbered years of shelved status, the licensee must submit a shelving affidavit.
- (5) A fee shall be assessed against the licensee during any period of approved shelved status.
- (6) Licensees can shelve consecutively for a maximum of three terms, or a total of six years, without Board approval. If the licensee wishes to extend shelving beyond six years, the licensee must submit a letter to the Board providing a satisfactory reason for continued shelving.
- (7) A licensee granted shelved status must complete, prior to renewal, any applicable continuing education that may be required during the period of time the license is shelved.
- (8) Upon reactivation, the licensee shall be required to complete a renewal application and pay the appropriate annual licensing fee regardless of the time remaining in the calendar year.
- (9) Any licensee of a shelved license found working in Putnam County shall be deemed unlicensed. He/she shall be subject to fines and penalties as provided for in this chapter.

Section II.

This Local Law shall take effect immediately upon filing with the New York Secretary of State.

WHEREAS, it is intended that NYSDOT's MEP discretionary grant funds will be awarded to projects that support fleet enhancement, deployment of new technologies and passenger amenities and maintenance facilities, as well as projects that help reduce the carbon footprint/harmful emissions within the service area and direct infrastructure investments in certain communities; and

WHEREAS, the grant funding is one hundred (100%) percent State funding and no local match is required; and

WHEREAS, the MEP discretionary funding is included in the 5-year State Transportation Plan administered through NYSDOT, and the deadline for application submission has passed; and

WHEREAS, Section 5-1(D)(1) of the Putnam County Code requires the Legislature approve all grant applications prior to their submission and that in the event time is of the essence requiring submission before Legislature approval is obtained for such application submission, consideration of the application shall occur at the next Full Legislature Meeting; and

WHEREAS, the County, by and through the Putnam County Department of Planning, Development and Public Transportation, is desirous to competitively seek grant funds through NYSDOT's MEP grant program and in furtherance therefor submitted the County's grant application to NYSDOT for such competitive funds totaling to \$137,909; and

WHEREAS, the Legislature, by and through the Physical Services Committee, approves the County's application for MEP grant funding and the Department of Planning, Development and Public Transportation herewith provides the application, attached hereto as Exhibit A, post-submission to the Legislature for review and ratification thereof for NYSDOT MEP grant funding; now therefore be it

Item #6q – Authorization/ Telecommunication Tower Agreement with Pamal Broadcasting Ltd. (Town of Philipstown Tax Map Nos.: 83.18-1-22 & 23)/ Conveyance of Town of Philipstown Tax Map Nos.: 83.18-1-24 to James J. Morrell was next. On behalf of the members of the Physical Services Committee, Legislators Gouldman and Nacerino, Legislator Albano moved the following:

Legislator Montgomery agreed that we need to move forward with the lease on the tower but stated that she did not understand why the two (2) needed to be lumped together; occupying space on the tower and the gift of this property. She believed enough was not known about the gift of this property; why is it needed, what it is for and can they put another tower on the property. She explained that we needed a 20x20 segment of the property to house our emergency equipment. She believed there was enough land with the existing property to do that. She did not understand why this could not have been approved separately and stated that was why she could not support this. She believed this was sloppy government to put them together.

Legislator Albano believed this made a lot of sense. He stated that the property is located right next to the tower and it was part of the agreement between the County and the property owners. He stated that the property has no use and will be merged with the property that the tower is on. He stated that it will be town home rule if there are any restrictions on the property. He believed it was explained quite well during the Physical Services Committee meeting.

Legislator Jonke believed this was a waste of time. He explained that this was vetted and explained during a Committee meeting and now a comment is being made that a second tower could be built next to the first tower on a piece of substandard land under the nose of the Town of Philipstown. He believed that would not happen. He believed that calling this sloppy was inappropriate. He stated that the property is not a gift and believed this makes great sense for the taxpayers of Putnam County and it will also help with our emergency service personnel.

Legislator Sayegh stated that she has plenty of backup material supporting this. There is an agreement from our Law Department, a tax map of the properties and a memo which explains that this will "increase the likelihood that the property taxes will continue to be paid and that the parcel will not revert back to the County in the future." She stated that this is unbuildable property that no one will own or pay taxes on unless it is merged with this particular property. She believed this made sense.

Legislator Sullivan concurred with Legislators Albano and Jonke. He explained that this has been discussed, passed through Committee and everyone is moving forward with it. He believed to continue discussing the same issues over and over was a waste of our time.

He believed that we should move forward with a vote on this and put an end to this and call the question.

Legislator Montgomery stated that she has a letter from the Town Supervisor, and as Legislator Albano indicated, it is not your call anymore once you hand this property over; it will be the Town's problem. She would like to know what the new owner will do with the property. She stated that none of the backup material indicated what he will do with the property. She asked if the residents of Philipstown could be assured that there will be no cell tower built on the site and that it will only be used for a building that will house communication equipment for the existing tower.

WHEREAS, James J. Morrell wishes to acquire Town of Philipstown Tax Map Number 83.18-1-24 from the County and merge same with Town of Philipstown Tax Map Number 83.18-1-23; and

WHEREAS, the County Executive, with the advice and assistance of the County Attorney and the Director of IT/GIS, has entered into preliminary negotiations with Pamal Broadcasting Ltd. and James J.
