APPROVAL - ADOPT PUTNAM COUNTY'S PROPOSED DISADVANTAGED BUSINESS ENTERPRISE (DBE) PROGRAM PLAN IN CONFORMANCE WITH AND AS REQUIRED BY THE U.S. DEPARTMENT OF TRANSPORTATION (USDOT) 49 CFR PART 26

WHEREAS, the U.S. Department of Transportation ("USDOT"), by and through the Federal Transit Administration ("FTA"), provides funding and/or financial assistance to transit providers to, among other things, develop new transportation systems and improve, maintain and operate existing systems; and

WHEREAS, the County of Putnam ("County") is a direct recipient of Federal funding and/or financial assistance, as defined in FTA C 4702.1B (the "Circular"), such funding authorized under Titles I, II, V and VI and, as such, compliance with the respective mandate thereunder is required, more specifically here, to ensure that DBEs have an equitable opportunity to participate in the County's USDOT-assisted contracts, to wit: (i) ensure non-discrimination in the award and administration of USDOT-assisted contracts; (ii) create a level playing field on which DBEs can compete fairly for USDOT-assisted contracts; (iii) ensure the County's DBE Program is narrowly tailored in accordance with applicable law; (iv) ensure that only firms that fully meet 49 CFR Part 26, et seq., eligibility standards are permitted to participate as DBEs; (v) help remove barriers to the participation of DBEs in USDOT-assisted contracts; and (vi) promote the use of DBEs in all types of federally-assisted contracts and procurement activities conducted by respective recipients; and

WHEREAS, the County, by and through the Department of Planning, Development and Public Transportation, in furtherance of the aforesaid objectives and as required by the FTA, has prepared, for submission to and approval by the FTA, the Putnam County DBE Program Plan (the "Plan"), supporting the integration into the County's services, programs and activities the considerations, goals and mandate of USDOT 49 CFR Part 26, et seq.; and

WHEREAS, the Plan's objectives include, without limitation, ensuring no person shall be excluded from participation in, deny any person the benefits of, or otherwise discriminate against anyone on the basis of race, color, sex or national origin in connection with the award and performance of any contract covered by USDOT 49 CFR Part 26, et seq; now therefore be it

Item #6p – Approval – Inclusion of Parcels in Putnam County Agricultural District was next. On behalf of the members of the Physical Services Committee, Legislators Castellano and Crowley, Legislator Ellner moved the following:

Legislator Ellner stated that the resolution is to decline to include any of the parcels requested for inclusion in the Putnam County Agricultural District.

Chairman Jonke called for a discussion.

Legislative Counsel Firriolo stated that before you proceed with the discussion, he stated that Chairman Jonke mentioned earlier that there was an error in the location of one (1) of the parcels. He stated that the resolution as currently drafted has Hidden Hope Farm under the Town of Southeast and it should be under the Town of Patterson. He suggested calling for a motion to amend to transfer Hidden Hope Farm from being categorized in the Town of Southeast to the Town of Patterson in order to correct that error.

Legislator Ellner made a motion to correct the location error of Hidden Hope Farm to the Town of Patterson; seconded by Chairman Jonke and Legislator Nacerino. All in favor.

Legislator Gouldman explained that some of the application requests for parcels to be included in the Agricultural District were approved by the Agricultural Board. He stated that at the Physical Services Committee meeting all the parcels were voted down. He explained that the Legislature appoints members to several advisory boards. He explained that the Agricultural Board advises the Legislature on agricultural and farming issues in Putnam County. He stated that the Supervisor of Putnam Valley, along with the Town Board are supportive of the Big Red Barn Farm parcel in Putnam Valley.

Legislator Gouldman made a motion to amend the resolved clause to include Big Red Barn Farm into the Agricultural District; seconded by Legislator Crowley.

Legislator Montgomery stated that she would like to vote on each parcel individually. She questioned how that could be done.

Legislative Counsel Firriolo stated that there is one (1) motion on the floor; Legislator Gouldman's. He stated that if his motion carries, Legislator Montgomery could amend it

again to include all the parcels. If the motion to include all the parcels carries, any Legislator may make a request to divide the question, so Legislator Montgomery could call for a vote on each parcel individually.

Chairman Jonke called for a discussion on Legislator Gouldman's motion to include Big Red Barn Farm.

Chairman Jonke stated that he would be inclined to vote in favor of these parcels, however, for the first time in eight (8) years as a Legislator, it was brought to his attention that Resolution #139 of 2007 states that parcels shall have 50% of prime farmland. He stated that Lobster Hill Farm is in his district, and he likes the whole idea of it, however he believed that they were disqualified because there is currently a violation on the property. He stated that he was supportive of amending Resolution #139 of 2007 to allow for inclusion, because apparently there were other parcels in the past that were included without looking at their soil types, which he believed was not right. He stated that he attended the Agricultural Board meeting, and the soil types were never brought up.

Legislator Montgomery thanked everyone who participated in this process. She wondered if any parcel in Putnam County met this arbitrary number for soil quality. She believed that there were many resolutions approved in the county which are not implemented. She believed this was a lengthy process, and the Agricultural Board invested a lot of time and effort before they approved the recommendation of five (5) parcels to be included in the Agricultural District. She stated that they are our advisory board, and she respected their input. She believed in the future we could revise the process of reviewing parcels. She stated that none of the information we are requiring was given to these applicants, therefore she did not believe it was fair to impose that resolution on them that was just found. She stated that she was in favor of the five (5) parcels that the Agricultural Board put forward for approval.

Legislator Ellner appreciated everyone that came out to speak at the Public Hearing. He stated that very important information was brought forward. He stated that as a Legislator and Chairman of the Physical Services Committee he was bound by the rules. He stated that the rules that exist today prevent him from voting in favor of any of these parcels. He stated that moving forward, Resolution #139 of 2007 would be reviewed and possibly modified.

Legislator Castellano concurred. He believed that we needed to follow our resolutions. He stated that he was in favor of amending the resolution, however there is a process in making changes. He stated that nobody is being shut down tonight. He stated that he was bound by Resolution #139 of 2007.

Legislator Nacerino stated that she was very conflicted and takes everyone's comments very seriously. She stated that she must agree with her colleagues that as a lawmaker it was her responsibility to be bound to follow State law and our resolution.

Chairman Jonke called for a Roll Call Vote on Legislator Gouldman's motion to include Big Red Barn Farm.

By Roll Call Vote: Four Ayes – Legislators Addonizio, Crowley, Gouldman & Montgomery. Four Nays - Legislators Castellano, Ellner, Nacerino & Chairman Jonke. Legislator Sayegh was absent. Motion fails.

Legislator Montgomery made a motion to include the five (5) applications put forward by the Agricultural Board; Ridge Ranch, Kascade Enterprises, Lobster Hill Farm, Big Red Barn Farm and Pine View Farm; seconded by Legislators Crowley and Gouldman.

Legislator Montgomery believed that there were incorrect comments made with what the resolution means and what is State law. She believed there were many incidences when resolutions or policies were not being implemented. She stated that these are just hardworking Putnam County people trying to run a small business.

Legislator Ellner respectfully disagreed with his colleague. He stated that the original resolution when it was drafted was very specific. He stated that the Legislature at that time chose to excluded parts what was available to them under NYS law. He believed that the last time four (4) parcels were put up for inclusion, two (2) of them failed because they did not have the requisite 50% soil requirement. He explained that the 50% requirement is not only the quality of the soil, it also deals with steep slopes. He stated that he must follow Resolution #139 of 2007 and NYS Agriculture & Markets law 29 regarding a commercial horse boarding operation being required to have at least 10 horses on the property.

Chairman Jonke stated that our rules are not arbitrary. He stated that he was in favor of amending the resolution which would allow these farms to be included.

Chairman Jonke called for a Roll Call Vote on Legislator Montgomery's motion to include the five (5) applications put forth by the Agricultural Board.

By Roll Call Vote: Four Ayes – Legislators Addonizio, Crowley, Gouldman & Montgomery. Four Nays – Legislators Castellano, Ellner, Nacerino & Chairman Jonke. Legislator Sayegh was absent. Motion fails.

Legislator Crowley made a motion to include Ridge Ranch, Lobster Hill Farm, Big Red Barn Farm and Pine View Farm; seconded by Legislator Addonizio.

Legislator Crowley believed that we have an antiquated resolution. She stated that the soil quality is not a law requirement, it is our resolution. She did not believe the resolution provides farmers the ability to do what they need to do. She believed they added a lot to the community. She stated that we need to revisit our resolution for next year, however for this year she believed in her heart that they were doing the right thing and she needed to follow her conscience.

Legislator Ellner stated that one (1) of the parcels Legislator Crowley recommended is a horse breeding operation and that is unequivocally State law that requires at least 10 horses and \$10,000 worth of revenue.

Chairman Jonke called for a Roll Call Vote:

By Roll Call Vote: Four Ayes - Legislators Addonizio, Crowley, Gouldman & Montgomery. Four Nays – Legislators Castellano, Ellner, Nacerino & Chairman Jonke. Legislator Sayegh was absent. Motion fails.

WHEREAS, November 19, 2019 marked the second 8-Year Anniversary of the formation of this district requiring the Putnam County Legislature to review this district and either continue, terminate or modify the district created; and

WHEREAS, by Resolution #204 of 2019 the Putnam County Legislature determined that the Putnam County Agricultural District No. 1 remained the same in accordance with the recommendations of the Putnam County Agriculture and Farmland Protection Board to consist of 157 parcels with a total acreage of 5,113.9 acres; and

WHEREAS, in 2024, requests were presented to the Putnam County Legislature to modify the existing Agricultural District in the County of Putnam by including the following parcels in the District:

Catherine Lewis, Emergency Medical Services Council Representative, for the remainder of a three (3) year term, said term to expire December 31, 2024.

WHEREAS, the Protective Services Committee of the Putnam County Legislature has reviewed and approved said appointments; now therefore be it

RESOLVED, that pursuant to Section 25-38(B) of the Putnam County Code, the Putnam County Legislature hereby confirms the above appointments to the Putnam County Emergency Services Safety Advisory Board made by the County Executive; and be it further

RESOLVED, that these appointments comply with any requirements to file an Oath of Office pursuant to the New York State Public Officers Law.

BY POLL VOTE: ALL AYES. LEGISLATOR SAYEGH WAS ABSENT. MOTION CARRIES.

Item #6ee – Authorization for Intermunicipal Agreement with Westchester County to Effectuate the Installation of Mobile Radios for the Police Departments Participating in a Mutual Aid and Rapid Response Plan was next.

Legislator Montgomery stated that she would be voting in favor of this. She stated that she would like some clarification on how this will work with our new radio system which we have invested in for fire and EMS. She hoped that all of these radio systems worked together.

Legislator Crowley stated that a comment was made that were no channels left and that was the reason we were receiving these radios. She hoped that we were actively searching for a resolution to this issue to eliminate having so much equipment and bring it down to one (1) radio. She stated that for now, she was happy to have this intermunicipal agreement.

RESOLUTION #186

AUTHORIZATION FOR INTERMUNICIPAL AGREEMENT WITH WESTCHESTER COUNTY TO EFFECTUATE THE INSTALLATION OF MOBILE RADIOS FOR THE POLICE DEPARTMENTS PARTICIPATING IN A MUTUAL AID AND RAPID RESPONSE PLAN

WHEREAS, pursuant to Article 5-G of the general Municipal Law, the County of Putnam and the County of Westchester (collectively the "Parties") created and entered into a Mutual Aid and Rapid Response Plan (the "Plan") to formalize operational procedures for law enforcement assistance to participating agencies; and

WHEREAS, the Plan provides that each member law enforcement agency agrees to make available its police personnel and equipment to the others upon the occurrence of a condition which is beyond the scope of its police resources; and

WHEREAS, the County of Westchester operates public safety radio communication systems for its Department of Public Safety, Department of Emergency Services, and Department of Public Works and Transportation Bee-Line transit operations; and

WHEREAS, the County of Putnam is in need of mobile radios for its municipal police vehicles programmed with radio communication systems that will allow it to communicate with the County of Westchester, law enforcement, fire, EMS and other first responders for purposes of carrying out the Plan; and

WHEREAS, the County of Westchester wishes to furnish the mobile radios to the County of Putnam for installation in its municipal polices vehicles; and

WHEREAS, the County of Westchester wishes to provide the mobile radios to the County of Putnam, as well as the initial radio programming services, at no charge to the County of Putnam; and

WHEREAS, the Parties desire to enter into an intermunicipal agreement to provide for the installation and operation of mobile radios (the "Radio Agreement"); and

WHEREAS, entry into such intermunicipal agreement is permitted under Article 5-G of the General Municipal Law; and

WHEREAS, due to prevailing world, national, and local security situations, the everincreasing flow of intelligence, and actual threats directed against once benign sites and facilities, the parties desire that the Radio Agreement be flexible and subject to review and revision as necessary in a timely manner; and

RESOLVED, that the County of Putnam be and hereby is authorized to enter into an intermunicipal agreement ("IMA") with the County of Westchester, in order to effectuate the installation and operation of mobile radios in municipal police vehicles; and be it further

RESOLVED, that such IMA shall be substantially similar in form and content to the draft items accompanying this resolution; and be it further

RESOLVED, that the term of the IMA will be five (5) years commencing in January, 2024, and continuing through January, 2029; and be it further

RESOLVED, that the County Executive is authorized to execute said IMA on behalf of the County of Putnam; and be it further

RESOLVED, that this resolution shall take effect immediately.

BY POLL VOTE: ALL AYES. LEGISLATOR SAYEGH WAS ABSENT. MOTION CARRIES.

Item #6ff – Approval – Resolution Advocating Against OSHA Reforms in New York State for Firefighters was next. On behalf of the members of the Protective Services Committee, Legislators Addonizio and Sayegh, Legislator Nacerino moved the following:

Legislator Nacerino stated that while we recognize and appreciate the work OSHA does to enhance our safety, we join our fire departments and other elected officials opposing the standards set forth which would dramatically change the face of firefighters in the United States and New York State. Legislator Nacerino continued by reading excerpts of the resolution. She expressed that Putnam County faces challenges in getting individuals to volunteer in the fire departments, as well as retaining these individuals. She believed that these new restrictions and mandates bring on more undue burdens. She believed they would further jeopardize our fire departments fiscally and with obtaining new recruitments. She stated that this resolution was brought forward by Legislator Gouldman.

Legislator Gouldman explained that OSHA is implementing new regulations to improve the safety of individuals in fire service which he was glad to see. He believed that the new regulations which treat volunteer fire departments the same as large paid fire departments did not make sense. He stated that it threatens the survival of our local fire departments here in Putnam County and throughout New York State. He stated that was the reason why he brought this resolution forward.

Legislator Crowley concurred with her colleagues. She hoped that we could find a solution for our volunteer firefighters, so we do not end up having to raise property taxes to have paid fire departments. She believed that would have a huge impact on our residents.

Legislator Montgomery stated that she supports this resolution. She stated that the community believes that the best service to taxpayers was for OSHA to start this rule making process over from the beginning. She hoped that was the sentiment of the fire departments and the elected officials. She stated that OSHA is a great organization, and she believed that they made these new rules because they were probably necessary. She stated that she was not opposing the new standards, but she was opposing the way OSHA went about it. She believed that our fire departments and municipalities need more time and to be part of the process.

RESOLUTION #187

APPROVAL - RESOLUTION ADVOCATING AGAINST OSHA REFORMS IN NEW YORK STATE FOR FIREFIGHTERS

WHEREAS, the County of Putnam is the home to 13 all-volunteer fire companies, that have served the County and its towns and villages faithfully for decades; and

WHEREAS, the personnel of these companies form the backbone of our emergency response apparatus, tirelessly working to ensure the safety, security, and well-being of our residents, often at great personal sacrifice; and

WHEREAS, the County of Putnam acknowledges, with gratitude, the commendable efforts of the Occupational Safety and Health Administration (OSHA) in initiating measures aimed at enhancing the safety and welfare of our invaluable emergency responders; and

WHEREAS, notwithstanding the strides made in bolstering emergency responder safety, the County of Putnam harbors legitimate concerns regarding the future accessibility, affordability, and efficacy of emergency services within our jurisdiction; and

WHEREAS, OSHA has published significant changes to OSHA Rule 1910.156, the Fire Brigades Standard, on February 5, 2024, converting the current Fire Brigades Standard to the proposed Emergency Response Standard, which has the potential to dramatically change the face of the fire service in the United States, the State of New York, and the County of Putnam; and

WHEREAS, the County of Putnam has serious concerns that the proposed changes will have major implications for every firefighter in the County of Putnam through unfunded mandates and possible fines for noncompliance, along with the imposition of additional liabilities upon fire service organizations and municipalities; and

WHEREAS, the County of Putnam believes the proposed changes are not economically and technically feasible for the volunteer fire service in present form and will cause our volunteer fire departments significant financial burden and hardships through increased costs for administration, training, equipment inspection and replacement, and facility renovations; and

WHEREAS, the County of Putnam believes the best service to taxpayers and the fire service community at large is for OSHA to start this rule making process over from the beginning; and

WHEREAS, this matter has been duly considered by the Legislature of the County of Putnam and the Putnam County Executive; now therefore be it

RESOLVED, that the County of Putnam, mindful of its responsibility to safeguard the interests and welfare of its residents, hereby expresses its reservations to the proposed changes to OSHA Rule 1910.156 and respectfully requests that OSHA, in conjunction with our state and national officials, give due consideration to the following:

- 1. Extend the public comment period beyond the deadline of July 22, 2024, so all fire service organizations and governmental bodies have adequate time to review the 608 page document and formulate comprehensive, fact based comments:
- 2. OSHA and the Congress of the United States of America should hold inperson public hearings on the proposed changes;
- 3. Remove the National Fire Protection Association (NFPA) standards (Twenty-one (21) being incorporated in whole or in part, and fourteen (14) other standards contributing to new requirements to varying degrees) from the proposed rule and continue these standards as voluntary consensus standards;
- 4. Reevaluate the intended audience and scope of the standard to accommodate the varying regulatory frameworks and classifications of volunteer firefighters across different states, ensuring equitable treatment and compliance with applicable laws and regulations;
- 5. Transform the proposed standard into a dynamic, adaptive "living document" capable of evolving in tandem with emerging national needs, technological advancements, and best practices, thereby obviating the need for periodic overhauls and updates to address obsolescence and inefficiency;
- 6. Identify and prioritize additional safety measures and protocols that can be expeditiously implemented with minimal resource expenditure and

manpower requirements, thereby augmenting the resilience and effectiveness of our emergency response infrastructure;

- 7. Collaborate closely with stakeholders to develop a standardized framework that strikes a judicious balance between economic feasibility and technical efficacy, thereby ensuring the sustainability and viability of our emergency response initiatives in the long run;
- 8. OSHA should provide clear definitions of "volunteer" and "employee" factoring in the various definitions found in the first responder community across the country to provide consistency in implementation of the proposed rule;
- 9. OSHA should start the rule making process on 1910.156 over giving the volunteer fire service who provide sixty-five (65) percent of firefighting services in the United States a formal seat at the rule making table;
- 10. Significant changes to OSHA Rule 1910.156, the Fire Brigade Standard, should be phased in over time to allow fire companies to come into compliance and to budget for the fiscal impacts caused by the changes; and be it further

RESOLVED, that Clerk of the Legislature is directed to forward copies of this resolution to OSHA, United States Senators Charles E. Schumer and Kirsten Gillibrand, United States Representative Michael Lawler, Governor Kathy Hochul, Senator Peter Harckham, Assembly Members Matthew Slater and Dana Levenberg, and any others deemed necessary and proper.

(Immediately Following Health & Physical Committee Mtgs. starting at 6:00 P.M.)

The meeting was called to order at 7:01 P.M. by Chairman Jonke who requested Legislative Counsel Firriolo lead in the Pledge of Allegiance and Legislator Sayegh lead in the Legislative Prayer. Upon roll call, Legislators Montgomery, Gouldman, Nacerino, Ellner, Castellano, Sayegh, Crowley and Chairman Jonke were present. Legislator Addonizio was absent. Also present was Legislative Counsel Firriolo.

Item #4 – Approval – Inclusion of Parcels in Putnam County Agricultural District was next.

Chairman Jonke explained that this item was tabled at the Full Legislative meeting held on August 6, 2024. Chairman Jonke called for a discussion.

Legislator Crowley explained that she was hoping that there would be communication and/or an adjustment proposed to the resolution.

Legislator Gouldman expressed that both the Putnam Valley Supervisor and Town Board were in support of adding the Big Red Barn Farm parcel into the Agricultural District. He stated that the Legislature received a letter from Putnam Valley Supervisor Jacqueline Annabi and the Code Enforcement Officer in support of the Big Red Barn Farm.

Legislator Gouldman made a motion to include the Big Red Barn Farm parcel in the Agricultural District; seconded by Legislator Crowley.

Legislator Ellner explained that NYS Law is very clear. You must have 10 horses and \$10,000 of revenue. He stated that there are not 10 horses and no receipts for revenue have been provided. He stated that the parcel did not qualify. He believed that the Town of Putnam Valley was never approached for any variances or special use permits, which he believed was the first step in this process.

Legislator Gouldman again referenced the letters of support from the Town of Putnam Valley.

Legislator Crowley questioned if Legislator Ellner, as Chair of the Physical Services Committee, requested the receipts for revenue.

Legislator Ellner said not directly, and it is not a requirement for him to do so. He stated that what is being interpretated is not correct. He stated that it is very clear that, per Agriculture & Markets Law 239, you must have 10 horses. He stated that the simple fact that the applicant has three (3) horses is enough to deny inclusion. He stated that the soils on the property also disqualify it. He stated that if the properties do not comply with any of the criteria on Resolution #139 of 2007, that would be enough to decline the application.

Legislator Montgomery stated that she understands what Legislator Ellner is saying, however, she would base her vote on the recommendation of the Agriculture & Farmland Protection Board, and more importantly, the recommendation of the Town Supervisor and Code Enforcement Officer. She sited that the application use is consistent with the previous owner and neighboring parcels and having demonstrated an adequate boarding capacity of 10 horses.

Legislator Nacerino stated that the revenue requirement is stipulated, and the applicant should have been aware of that. She believed it was ironic that we would negate from the law based on assumption and speculation.

Legislator Castellano stated it appears that although the town wants this approved, there is a remedy with the town, with the special district and the Zoning Board. He stated that if the town wants to handle that, it should be handled at the town level and not by the Agriculture & Farmland Protection Board.

Legislator Sayegh concurred with Legislator Castellano. She explained that on the Agriculture & Markets website they have guidelines for review of local zoning and planning laws. She stated that the towns can go to Agriculture & Markets to review these laws. She stated that we can remedy this situation moving forward by changing our Resolution #139 of 2007, which she believed was going to be done tonight, to be able to move some of these properties into the Agricultural District. However, she was not willing to skirt around our laws at this time. She stated that we needed to abide by our resolution and the State law. She stated that the Agricultural District was formed to counter act local government infringing on farming operations. The intent was to preserve farmland in New York State, which she believed we were all in favor of. She proceeded to read some of the restrictions and/or requirements.

Legislator Crowley stated that she spoke to Soil & Water District Manager Neal Tomann. She believed that he stated if any of these parcels are included, he would need to submit a SEQRA. She believed that moving forward, it was important to require the applicants to submit this so that when the application goes to the Agriculture & Farmland Protection Board for review, a lot of the answers to questions have already been provided. She stated that it would negate the process that we are going through right now.

Legislator Montgomery stated that for this particular applicant they would not need a site plan because the adequate boarding capacity for 10 horses is already there. She believed that a resolution was a sentiment or intent and was not a law. She stated that she did not intend to enforce that resolution now. She stated that while we have these State and County restrictions, she would base her vote on input from town government.

Legislator Sayegh wanted to point out that we were not saying no to these businesses. She stated that each applicant can continue to operate the way they have been. She believed that Resolution #139 of 2007 should be revised and give them the opportunity to be included next year.

Legislator Nacerino concurred with Legislator Sayegh. She explained that she was the deciding vote to table this item. She stated that this has been a complicated process this year. She believed that we needed to follow process and procedure, our resolution and State law. She stated that it did not impede the operations of any farm. She has asked Legislator Ellner to place Resolution #139 of 2007 on the Physical Services Committee agenda for discussion. She explained that we could figure out ways to justify Legislator Crowley's concerns and possibly the notification to neighbors of farms requesting inclusion. She believed there will be a lot of discussion on this to develop ways to improve efficiencies.

Chairman Jonke stated that to be fair to the Agriculture & Farmland Protection Board, at the time they were voting on the parcels for inclusion, he did not believe they were aware of Resolution #139 of 2007. He stated that moving forward, he was in favor of amending that resolution. He stated that as Legislator Nacerino mentioned, at the very least if someone applies to be included in the Agricultural District, most towns have a 500-foot notification radius. He believed that the neighbors should be made aware of the request especially if it is occurring in a residential area. He believed the neighbors should be given the opportunity to voice their opinion. As Legislator Nacerino stated, what we do or do not do tonight will not impede the legal operation of any of the farms going forward.

Chairman Jonke called for a Roll Call Vote on the motion to include the Big Red Barn Farm.

By Roll Call Vote: Three Ayes – Legislators Crowley, Gouldman and Montgomery. Five Nays – Legislators Castellano, Ellner, Nacerino, Sayegh and Chairman Jonke. Legislator Addonizio was absent. Motion Fails.

Legislator Montgomery question if we could divide the question.

Legislative Counsel Firriolo explained at this point there is no question to divide because the only motion that was made was to include one (1) parcel which failed. He stated that we are now left with the original resolution which states that the Legislature declines to include any parcels.

Legislator Montgomery made a motion to include the Pine View Farm in the Agricultural District; seconded by Legislator Gouldman.

Legislator Montgomery explained that the Agriculture & Farmland Protection Board voted to include this parcel by a vote of 9-2 in favor. The Town Supervisor and Town Board are in favor of this. She believed it was a farm for hundreds of years and they are restoring it back to its original enterprise.

Legislator Ellner stated that there are four (4) parcels and three (3) of the four (4) have 0% of soil groups 1-6. He stated that in 2007, the County derived from NYS Agriculture & Markets Law, a system to rate the soils. He stated that NYS Agriculture & Markets Law states that the parcels must have predominantly prime agricultural soil. He stated that was determined to be soil groups 1-6. He stated that three (3) of the four (4) parcels have 0% and the 4th parcel has 46%, therefore this application is defective. He stated that this is not open to interpretation. The Agriculture & Farmland Protection Board does not make policy for the County. They are supposed to provide expert advice and only meet when there are applications before them. He stated that Resolution #139 of 2007 was provided to them which was indicated in their meeting minutes.

Legislator Crowley stated that at the time Resolution #139 of 2007 was approved, equine was not even included. It was added in later.

Legislator Ellner stated that he disagreed. He stated that the equine portion is Agriculture & Markets State Law.

Legislator Crowley stated that when we adopted it in after, and at that time the soil content should have looked at and taken into consideration when running a farm for animals. She stated that the soil content is not going to affect animals that are rotating and herding on the properties. She believed that by rotating the animals made the soil more protein rich and hardy.

Legislator Sayegh concurred with Legislator Crowley and believed that the resolution needed to be revisited in order to make our Agricultural District better. However, she believed that we need to follow the current laws and resolutions on the books today. She stated that each of these farms can continue their operations. She stated that the reason you apply to be included in the Agricultural District is to receive benefits. She proceeded to read some of those benefits.

Legislator Montgomery believed that if this is going the way I think it is going, then we will have to go back and examine every parcel that we have approved in the past that does not meet the criteria on the resolution, which she believed was not a law but a sentiment. She stated that she would like to review all resolutions that are not implemented. She stated that you are about to deny an application based on the soil quality when they are not even going to be planting anything. She stated that it is a critically endangered cow operation.

Legislator Nacerino explained that the Legislature has been made aware of Resolution #139 of 2007. She stated that the fact that we know is the reason we must adhere to it and comply with it. She stated that State law supersedes any resolution whether or not certain components were included or excluded from the resolution.

Legislator Ellner said, "yes."

Chairman Jonke called for a Roll Call Vote on the motion to include Pine View Farm.

By Roll Call Vote: Three Ayes – Legislators Crowley, Gouldman and Montgomery. Five Nays – Legislators Castellano, Ellner, Nacerino, Sayegh and Chairman Jonke. Legislator Addonizio was absent. Motion Fails.

Legislator Crowley mentioned for the record that equine was added to the State Agricultural District in 2011. She believed that it was unfair that our resolution was not reviewed at that time.

Chairman Jonke stated that many things were overlooked. He stated that this is the eighth year as a Legislator participating in the inclusion of parcels in the Agricultural District. He stated that this was never brought to his attention before, and shame on them whoever was in charge back then. He stated that it is not obscure, it is the criteria for inclusion. He stated that Legislator Crowley was the Legislative Representative on the Agriculture & Farmland Protection Board. He stated that none of what you stated tonight was said prior to tonight.

Legislator Nacerino explained that whether it was included or whenever it came to light, this is a meaningful discussion, and we understand and recognize that we need to move forward in a different direction. She believed that we needed to reconsider and take into account the things we now have knowledge of. However, State law supersedes everything. Whether it was 2007 or 2011, the State law is specific.

Legislator Montgomery explained again that everyone can continue on with their businesses and hopefully will comply with town code and laws. She stated that this will not prevent anyone from farming.

Legislator Crowley stated that she brought many of her concerns about how the Agriculture & Farmland Protection Board was being operated to Chairman Jonke and Legislator Ellner. She stated that she also had conversations with Legislative Counsel Firriolo about certain rules not being followed. She believed it was untrue to say that she did not come to anyone for support or help.

Chairman Jonke called the question to vote on the resolution.

RESOLUTION #189

APPROVAL - INCLUSION OF PARCELS IN PUTNAM COUNTY AGRICULTURAL DISTRICT

WHEREAS, by Resolution #81 of 2003, the Putnam County Legislature created an Agricultural District in the County of Putnam; and

WHEREAS, by Resolution #193 of 2011, after the 8th year anniversary of the formation of the district, the Putnam County Legislature modified said Putnam County Agricultural District #1, and

WHEREAS, by Resolution #244 of 2003, the Putnam County Legislature established the month of November in which a landowner may request inclusion in the Putnam County Agricultural District; and

WHEREAS, by Resolution #154 of 2015, the Putnam County Legislature changed the annual thirty-day inclusion request period, from the month of November to April 1st through April 30th, commencing in the year 2016 and each year thereafter; and

WHEREAS, November 19, 2019 marked the second 8-Year Anniversary of the formation of this district requiring the Putnam County Legislature to review this district and either continue, terminate or modify the district created; and

WHEREAS, by Resolution #204 of 2019 the Putnam County Legislature determined that the Putnam County Agricultural District No. 1 remained the same in accordance with the recommendations of the Putnam County Agriculture and Farmland Protection Board to consist of 157 parcels with a total acreage of 5,113.9 acres; and

WHEREAS, in 2024, requests were presented to the Putnam County Legislature to modify the existing Agricultural District in the County of Putnam by including the following parcels in the District:

WHEREAS, the Department of Agriculture and Markets recommends that the County Legislative body serve as the Lead Agency to insure compliance with the

requirement of the State Environmental Quality Review Act as it is the only other agency required to undertake an action except for the Department of Agriculture and Markets; now therefore be it

RESOLVED, that with respect to the inclusion of any additional parcels into the Putnam County Agricultural District in 2024, the Putnam County Legislature declares itself to be the lead agency to ensure compliance with the requirements of the State Environmental Quality Review Act.

There being no other business, at 7:38 P.M., Chairman Jonke made a motion to adjourn; seconded by Legislator Sayegh. All in favor.

Program Coordinator - to coordinate and conduct forensic interviews where needed facilitate case review meetings with team members, facilitate forensic interviewing peer review, oversee efforts to identify crime victims, as well as coordinate with other service providers and community resources.

The County Attorney may also be removed by the County Legislature by a two-thirds vote by the Legislature if he or she refuses to comply with § 8.05 of this article.



I am writing to request that a grant amendment to the FY22 NYS Department of Homeland Security and Emergency Services Domestic Terrorism Prevention (DTP) Grant be initiated to hire two (2) part-time Threat Assessment Analysts. It has been identified that each TAM submission to this office incurs a significant investment of time and investigative resources to substantiate the validity of the threat. Sworn Investigators are being diverted from other law enforcement duties related to investigations of TAMs in order to compile, analyze, and interpret data from open-source media in addition to coordinating the sharing of information within the criminal justice community. Additionally, if the TAM threat level designation warrants, the constant monitoring of individuals would require a significant investment of time that would again detract from other investigative functions of sworn Investigators. The use of FY22 DTP funds to hire part-time analysts at a rate of \$30.00 per hour will allow the Sheriff's Office the ability to increase our investigative capacity while using sworn law enforcement resources more effectively. I have attached the job description and new duties statement to this request.



The Putnam County Department of Public Works is requesting the consideration of the repurposing of the Farmers Mills Road (8757.67) Bridge Project funds to the Fair St.

Reconstruction Project (8756.09). Currently, and as indicated on the most recent TIP, the Farmers Mills Rd. Project includes \$551,000 for DETLDES/PRELDES/ROWINCD obligating this FFY, \$138,000 for ROWACQU obligating in FFY 2025 and \$4.793M for CONST/CONINSP obligating in FFY 2026. After thorough evaluation and consideration of alternative immediate needs, the Department feels as if the Farmers Mills Rd. Bridge is not of immediate nor short term concern. The bridge currently lacks any significant visible structural deficiencies and has not been flagged by NYSDOT Inspectors as of now.

The Fair St. Reconstruction Project is scheduled to be let this Spring/Summer with \$24.705M obligated for CONST & CONINSP this FFY. Due to the industry-wide construction market trend increases since the last estimate and programming of funds, the Department anticipates a potential shortfall upon opening of bids. To avoid any delays associated with the potential for a funding shortfall and subsequent impacts to the project schedule, we feel as if the Farmers Mills funds would be better utilized if they were to be repurposed to the Fair St. Reconstruction Project.

We respectfully request your consideration for the reappropriation of funds as outlined above.
