

Upon roll call, Legislators Montgomery, Gouldman, Russo, Ellner, Jonke, Birmingham and Chairwoman Sayegh were present. Legislators Addonizio and Crowley were absent.

PROCLAMATIONS

Chairwoman Sayegh recognized Legislator Jonke presented the "Sale of Buddy Poppies" proclamation to Joan Russell and Carol Russel of the VFW Auxiliary Post #1374.

SUPPORT OF THE 2025 SALE OF BUDDY POPPIES

WHEREAS, Putnam County recognizes our youth as important community members, and values their unique skills, perspectives, and ideas, as they lead awareness, service, and advocacy activities; and

WHEREAS, Youth Bureau volunteers donate their time to programs such as Youth Court, Youth Forum, Youth Board, Teen-N-Kids Mentoring and a wide variety of service activities throughout Putnam County; and

MAY 2025 AS GLOBAL YOUTH TRAFFIC SAFETY MONTH

WHEREAS, May has been designated as Global Youth Traffic Safety Month to raise awareness of safety issues associated with teen driving and encourage and empower youth to develop and lead traffic safety education projects, support law enforcement and actively promote legislation to protect youth passengers and teen drivers; and

WHEREAS, According to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, traffic-related crashes are the leading cause of death for youth in the United States. Young drivers from the ages of 16 to 19 years old are three times more likely to be in a fatal car crash than drivers over the age of 20. In addition to summertime, a teen driver's risk of a fatal crash increases with each additional passenger, at night, on the weekends, and during his or her first months of driving; and

WHEREAS, Considering drivers in this age group only account for four percent of drivers on the roadways yet are involved in eight percent of all crashes on the road today, and the need for intense effort on youth traffic safety is apparent; and

WHEREAS, The New York State Governor's Traffic Safety Committee is endorsing the Putnam County Youth Bureau's initiatives to spread awareness and ensure that youth are equipped with the information they need to make safe decisions while driving. Youth can drive safer by putting away their phones when they drive, buckling up, choosing the safest route available, only driving with those with whom they feel safe and by never getting into a vehicle with someone they suspect has been drinking; now therefore be it

RESOLVED, that the Putnam County Executive and the Putnam County Legislature do hereby proclaim May 2025 as Global Youth Traffic Safety Month.

Chairwoman Sayegh recognized legislator Montgomery who presented the "Mental Health Awareness" proclamation to Commissioner of Social Services Sara Servadio and Mental Health Director Paul Tang.

MAY 2025 AS MENTAL HEALTH AWARENESS MONTH

WHEREAS, mental health symptoms and diagnoses affect millions of New York Residents translating to 1 in 4 New Yorkers who have symptoms of a mental health disorder; and

WHEREAS, some populations are more at risk of certain mental health diagnoses, mental health symptoms can affect anyone regardless of their age, gender, race, religion or socioeconomic status; and

WHEREAS, four million children and adolescents in the United States suffer from a serious mental health diagnosis that causes significant functional impairments at home, at school and with peers; and

WHEREAS, the disease burden or total cost of mental health diagnoses exceeds that caused by all cancers; and

WHEREAS, having a mental health diagnosis is the number one risk factor for suicide and about 90% of individuals who die by suicide meet criteria for a mental health diagnosis, oftentimes, it is undiagnosed or untreated; and

WHEREAS, Putnam County Residents report a decreasing perception that there are sufficient quality mental health providers, high levels of pandemic impact on self-reported mental health, increasing social isolation, and increasing frequency of drug use for non-medical purposes demonstrate an overall increased burden of mental health challenges; and

WHEREAS, about a third of all people experiencing mental health diagnoses and about half of people living with severe mental illnesses also experience substance misuse making access to effective treatment even more difficult; and

RESOLVED, that the Putnam County Executive and the Putnam County Legislature do hereby proclaim May 2025 as Mental Health Awareness Month and along with Putnam County Department of Mental Health and all mental health providers in Putnam County encourage all residents to challenge their own stigma about mental health, learn more about local resources and reach out for help as needed.

WHEREAS, the County of Putnam is the owner of the property located at 161 Hill Street, Mahopac, New York a/k/a Town of Carmel TM# 64.14-1-8 a/k/a the Putnam County Golf Course (the "Property"); and

WHEREAS, the County desires to use a minor portion of the Property for the installation of a 160 foot cellular tower, with the associated equipment shelter, backup generators, and telecommunications equipment; and

WHEREAS, Homeland Towers, LLC (hereinafter "Homeland"), desires to use a portion of the Property to install the support structure and compound area necessary to accommodate the emergency telecommunications coverage needs of various County Emergency Service Departments, in addition to providing the capacity for the collocation of private public utility wireless communications facilities in order to close significant gaps in reliable wireless service that exist in the vicinity of the Property within the County, and avoid the proliferation of towers; and

WHEREAS, the County and Homeland desire to enter into a public-private partnership by entering into a lease agreement (hereinafter the "Agreement"), a copy of which is attached hereto as Schedule "A", for the purpose of constructing a 160 foot tower and supporting equipment (the "Facility") with County emergency service antennas, and which shall provide for the collocation of commercial wireless communication facilities including antennas and related equipment on the Facility all of which shall be situated on or within a 2,611 (apx.) square foot lease parcel; and

WHEREAS, the County Executive, pursuant to the authority granted under section 31-22 of the Putnam County Code, has entered into negotiations with Homeland regarding the Agreement; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to section 31-22 of the Putnam County Code, the County Executive has requested that the Putnam County Legislature approve the Agreement; and

WHEREAS, the Facility will provide and facilitate wireless telecommunication services essential for responding to accidents, natural disasters, and for reporting medical emergencies and other dangers such as potential criminal activity; and

WHEREAS, the Agreement between the County and Homeland is for surplus County property not presently being utilized by the County and not anticipated to be needed by the County over the term of the Agreement other than for the placement of County antennas and equipment at the Facility; and

WHEREAS, the installation of a wireless communications facility and the approval of lease agreement thereof has been determined to be a SEQR Unlisted Action in accordance with the 6 NYCRR Part 617; and

WHEREAS, in accordance with the requirements of SEQRA, a full Environmental Assessment form ("EAF"), along with a natural resources inventory including wetlands and endangered species, a Federal Aviation Administration ("FAA") aeronautical evaluation, an antenna site Federal Communications Commission ("FCC") RF justification report, and a visual resource evaluation were prepared to describe the potential environmental impacts associated with the project; and

WHEREAS, that unless otherwise objected to, the Putnam County Legislature previously declared, pursuant to Resolution #322 of 2024, their intent to serve as "lead agency" in accordance with 6 NYCRR Part 617.2; and

WHEREAS, the Putnam County Department of Planning, on behalf of the Putnam County Legislature, circulated said notice to serve as lead agency along with the full EAF and above-noted supporting documentation to all involved and/or interested agencies on December 20, 2024 for the required minimum thirty (30) day period; and

WHEREAS, the Putnam County Legislature has received no objection with respect to its intent to act as lead agency with respect to the implementation of SEQRA, and therefore, assumes Lead Agency status herein with respect to this project; and

WHEREAS, based upon a careful review of the action as a whole, the EAF, supporting documents, and the criteria set forth in 6 NYCRR Part 617.7(c), and after considering all of the public input that has been received, as well as concerns received from other involved and/or interested agencies which have been addressed and/or mitigated, the Putnam County Legislature, as Lead Agency, has determined that the project will not result in any significant adverse environmental impacts; and

WHEREAS, it is recognized under New York State Law that counties are accorded certain "immunity" from local zoning regulations; and

WHEREAS, the leading New York Court of Appeals decision, <u>Matter of County of Monroe v City of Rochester</u>, 72 N.Y. 2d 338, 533 N.Y.S. 2d 702 ("<u>Monroe</u>"), establishes the "balancing of interests" approach for determining whether a project should be accorded immunity from local zoning regulations; and

WHEREAS, <u>Monroe</u> permits the County to determine whether or not it is in the public interest to subject a particular project serving governmental interests to local zoning; and

WHEREAS, <u>Monroe</u> discusses the following nine (9) factors for consideration when balancing the interests of the public and the governmental entity:

- 1) The nature and scope of the instrumentality seeking immunity;
- 2) The encroaching governmental entity's legislative grant of authority;
- 3) The kind of function or land use involved;
- 4) The effect local land use regulation would have upon the enterprise concerned;
- 5) Alternative locations for the facility in less restrictive zoning areas;
- 6) The impact upon legitimate local interest;
- 7) Alternative methods of providing the proposed improvement;
- 8) The extent of the public interest to be served by the improvements; and
- 9) The intergovernmental participation in the project development process and an opportunity to be heard: and

WHEREAS, the County has analyzed each of the foregoing considerations to determine whether the Facility should be exempt from the local municipal zoning regulations and has determined that the Facility as proposed, should be exempt from such zoning regulations; now therefore be it

RESOLVED, that after duly noticed public hearings upon the evidence adduced there as, it is found and determined that based upon a review of the foregoing considerations, the Putnam County Legislature has adopted the following findings of fact:

1) Pursuant to section 3 of New York State County Law, the County is a municipal corporation of the State of New York. Among other things, the County provides emergency and public safety protection to its residents. For example, the

County operates an EMS department pursuant to section 223-b of New York State County Law and a Sheriff's department pursuant to Article 17 of New York State County Law. Such departments rely heavily on wireless communications to protect the public health, safety and welfare. Reliable wireless communications are a critical resource that is necessary for the County to provide emergency and public safety protection. Therefore, the County is purely public in nature and is a governmental entity that provides an essential public service.

- 2) The Facility will be located within the municipal border of the Town of Carmel (the "Town") and within the County of Putnam. Under Section 31-22 of the Putnam County Code, the County has authority to lease surplus County owned lands. Pursuant to Section 3 of the New York State County Law, the County is a municipal corporation comprising the inhabitants within its boundaries and formed for the purpose of exercising such powers and discharging such duties of local government and administration of public affairs as may be imposed or conferred upon it by law.
- The function or land use that is contemplated by the County under the 3) lease agreement is a wireless communications facility (the "Facility"). The Facility will consist of a 160-foot tower and compound to support the communication needs of various County departments and to provide for the collocation of antennas operated by wireless public utility telecommunications service providers. Such collocation opportunities will decrease the proliferation of towers. The Facility will serve the public interest in that it allows the County public service and emergency service entities the ability to effectively communicate through the County's wireless systems. The Facility will also offer the general public and the County emergency service entities a wireless communications alternative particularly well suited for responding to accidents, natural disasters, and for reporting medical emergencies and other dangers such as potential criminal activity. The County notes that federally licensed wireless services such as Verizon Wireless, have been deemed to be essential public services by both New York State and Federal Courts. See, Cellular One v. Rosenberg, 82 NY2d 364 (1993), and Cellular Telephone Company v. Town of Oyster Bay, 166 V.3d 490 (2d Cir. 1999).
- Imposing local land use regulations on the proposed Facility would have the effect of unreasonably delaying an essential public need for immediate and effective emergency response and reliable wireless communications. It is the public policy of the United States "to make available so far as possible, to all people of the United States a rapid, efficient, nationwide and world-wide wire and radio communication service with adequate facilities at reasonable charges, for the purpose of national defense, for the purpose of promoting safety of life and property through the use of wire and radio communication...[.]" 47 U.S.C §151. The project will also further the goals and objectives established by Congress under the federal Telecommunications Act of 1996. The federal Telecommunications Act of 1996 is "an unusually important legislative enactment," establishing national public policy in favor of encouraging "rapid deployment of new telecommunications technologies (emphasis supplied)." Reno v. ACLU, 521 U.S. 844, 17 S. Ct.2329, 2337-38, 138 L.Ed.2d 874 (1997). The federal

Telecommunications Act of 1996 builds upon the regulatory framework for commercial mobile (radio) services which Congress established in 1993. Indeed, since 1993, it has been the policy of the United States "to foster the growth and development of mobile services that, by their nature, operate without regard to state lines as an integral part of the national telecommunication infrastructure." H.R. Rep. No. 103-111, 103dCong., 1st ess 260 (1993) (emphasis added). In 1999, Pub. L 106-81, 113 Stat. 1286 (the "911 Act"). The "911 Act" empowered the FCC to develop the regulations to make wireless 911 services available to all Americans. The express purpose of the Act, as articulate by Congress, was "to encourage and facilitate the prompt deployment throughout the United State of seamless, ubiquitous, and reliable end-to-end infrastructure for communications, including wireless communications, to meet the Nation's public safety and other communications need" (emphasis added).

- 5) There are no alterative locations for the Facility in less restrictive zoning areas as detailed in the alternative site analysis as such facilities are permitted in all Town zoning districts by conditional use permit. Moreover, the proposed location for the Facility at the subject Property is ideal in order to minimize aesthetic impacts to the greatest extent feasible based on the large size of the property and distance from neighboring uses, as demonstrated by the Visual Resource Evaluation. The Property already supports municipal operations and therefore, the location of the Facility on County property will not be detrimental to the community. By controlling the location of the Facility on County property, the County can ensure that there is adequate infrastructure in place for the location of emergency communication antennas, while controlling the proliferation of new towers. Moreover, the Facility is part of an overall County wide wireless communications network. The location of the Facility fits within the existing County wide network and remedies gaps in service that currently hamper emergency services communications.
- The Facility will not have an adverse environmental or other impact on the 6) public because the Facility will be sited on a wooded area of the Property. The Facility will benefit the public interest by providing essential services and by producing revenue for the County, while also providing critical infrastructure for County emergency wireless communications and public utility commercial wireless services and will be sited to minimize any potential adverse environmental impacts. The Facility will comply with all structural standards and will not adversely affect the health, safety, or general welfare of the public. The Facility will not cause any harmful interference with the frequencies of any radio, television, telephone or other uses. The Facility will have no impact on pedestrian or vehicular traffic since the proposed use is unmanned requiring infrequent maintenance visits of approximately one per month. The Facility will not produce any smoke, gas, odor, heat, dust, noise above ambient levels, fumes, vibrations, or flashing lights; the Facility will not generate solid waste, wastewater or sewage, will not require water supply or waste disposal, and will not attract insects, vermin, or other vectors. Any human exposure to electromagnetic energy from the Facility, even under "worst case" conditions, will be several orders of magnitude below the exposure limits established by the FCC, the American National

Standards Institute, the Institute of Electronic and Electrical Engineers, the National Council on Radiation Protection and Measurements, and the New York State Department of Health. The Facility will not impact any wetlands and will not be located within any wetland buffers.

- 7) Due to the topography of the County, the proposed height of the Facility is necessary to provide reliable wireless communications services in the local area and support collocation thereby discouraging the proliferation of towers.
- 8) The Facility will protect and promote the public interest in that it will serve and benefit the entire community by providing the infrastructure necessary to offer the public wireless telecommunications services essential for protecting public health, safety, and welfare, including the provision of enhanced 911 services.
- 9) The zoning exemption contemplated by this resolution shall apply and extend to the commercial public utility antennas and related equipment located on or associated with the Facility consistent with the decision of the New York State Court of Appeals in the Matter of Crown Communication New York Inc., 4 N.Y.3d 159.
- 10) The Agreement is for County land that will not be required by the County over the term of the Agreement except to the extent that the County will place its antennas and equipment at the Facility. The County will benefit from the Agreement revenue as well as the ability to place its antennas and equipment on the Facility. Moreover, the public private partnership will result in the County not being required to expend significant resources to construct and maintain the necessary tower and supporting infrastructure.
- 11) The County Legislature has reviewed the Agreement and has conducted a public hearing. All Involved/Interested Agencies, including the Town in which the Facility is located, have been notified of the proposal and offered the opportunity to comment; and be it further

RESOLVED, that the Putnam County Legislature designates itself as "Lead Agency" in this matter, as defined in 6 NYCRR Part 617.2(u); and be it further

RESOLVED, that the Putnam County Legislature as "Lead Agency", hereby determines that the project will not have any significant adverse environmental impacts; and be it further

RESOLVED, that a Draft Environmental Impact Statement will not be prepared; and be it further

RESOLVED, that the Putnam County Legislature, as "Lead Agency" hereby issues a Negative Declaration in connection with the project, a copy of which is attached hereto as Schedule "B"; and be it further

RESOLVED, that the lease premises are surplus space owned by the County; and be it further

RESOLVED, that the Putnam County Legislature approves the Agreement between the County and Homeland, in the form attached hereto and made a part hereof as Schedule "A", and that the Putnam County Executive is authorized to execute said Agreement; and be it further

RESOLVED, that the Agreement shall be subject to and conditioned upon the County obtaining the requisite waiver of the right of first refusal held by the New York City Department of Environmental Protection, as same is contained in Restrictive Covenant No. 4 in the certain deed recorded in Liber 1647 at Page 280 in the Office of the Putnam County Clerk; and be it further

RESOLVED, that the Agreement shall be further subject to and conditioned upon the County obtaining all necessary and required legislation and approvals as may be required for the alienation of public parkland in connection with the Facility; and be it further

RESOLVED, that the County Attorney is authorized to take whatever legal action is necessary to effectuate the Agreement between the County and Homeland in the manner approved herein; and be it further

RESOLVED, that based upon the foregoing balancing of interest, it is not in the public interest to subject the Facility to local zoning land use regulations.

Brett Yarris, Town of Carmel Hamlet, thanked the Legislature for codifying the Live Streaming of meetings. He thanked Legislator Crowley for bringing the resolution forward, and Legislator Jonke's efforts to get us to where we are now from an infrastructure standpoint. He thanked Legislator Montgomery for her persistence in bringing this issue to the forefront. He hoped to see the same for the public comment as well.

Scott Seaman, Town of Southeast resident, stated he was present for the Brewster Board of Education in regard to the proclamations. He thanked the Legislature and the County

Executive for their appreciation in support of their students. He stated that we all know that mental health is in a crisis.

Item #9 – Recognition of Legislators

Legislator Montgomery stated that Putnam County lost Jean Roberts, a 97-year-old Philipstown resident. She was a nurse at Butterfield Hospital and was also a big force behind the Ambulance Corps. She worked at Putnam Hospital for 35-40 years, retiring at the age of 81-years-old. She explained that there has been a lot of uncertainty going back and forth with the sales tax extension. She stated that she has not received a single call, letter or seen a public comment asking for us to lower the sales tax. She believed that people have asked us to stop the chaos and come to this compromise. She stated that every town and village in our County has passed resolutions in support of what is before the State Legislature now. She stated that it was not her original proposal, but she was here tonight willing to compromise because she believed that was what governing demands of us after spending five (5) months on this. She stated that we have bipartisan support throughout the County and now on a State level. She stated that when we receive the final bill numbers from the State, she requested that we act on it swiftly.



SPECIAL MEETING OF THE PUTNAM COUNTY LEGISLATURE CALLED BY THE CLERK AT THE REQUEST OF THE CHAIRWOMAN HELD IN ROOM #318 OF THE PUTNAM COUNTY OFFICE BUILDING CARMEL, NEW YORK 10512

Monday May 19, 2025 6:00 P.M.

The meeting was called to order at 6:07 P.M. by Chairwoman Sayegh who requested that Legislator Jonke lead in the Pledge of Allegiance and Legislator Russo lead in the Legislative Prayer. Upon roll call, Legislators Montgomery, Gouldman, Addonizio, Russo, Ellner, Jonke, Birmingham, Crowley and Chairwoman Sayegh were present.

Item #4 – Approval - Rule Request - Requesting the New York State Legislature Enact Senate Bill S7540A and Assembly Bill A8080A was next.

Legislator Birmingham stated as a point of order that the law firm, which he is a partner in, represents three (3) of the municipalities in Putnam County which would be affected by this. He stated that as he has done in the past, he would recuse himself from any discussion or voting on this. He stated that he would also step out of the room while this is being discussed. He asked that he be notified when the discussion is finished.

Legislator Montgomery explained that there was a lot of interest from the public and from the towns and villages who voted unanimously asking us to support this. She proceeded to read the statement that she wrote. She stated that this was not her original proposal. She stated that governing is not about holding rigidly to one (1) idea. She stated that it is about adapting, listening, and moving forward in the best interest of the residents.

Legislator Crowley stated that she was thankful that we were giving this another chance. She thanked our State representatives, Town Supervisors, Highway Superintendents and everyone who came together in a bipartisan movement to make this happen.

Legislator Jonke stated that he was opposed to the extension of the full 1%. He did not believe that we needed the full 1% revenue and that we could still share with the towns. He proceeded to read the County Executive's memorandum from January 16, 2025 supporting the 1% extension. Legislator Jonke stated that he disagreed in the County Executive's statement, "If not extended, the revenue loss to Putnam County would also jeopardize the delivery of critical public services and massively interfere with needed capital investments approved." Legislator Jonke stated that money has already been set aside. He stated that we do not need additional sales tax revenue to pay for those projects. He stated that after this memorandum was received from the County Executive, some Legislators proposed reducing the percentage on the sales tax extension. He explained that the reaction from the County Executive was to get the town supervisors and village mayors together with the message of "tax relief that matters"; a property tax reduction. Legislator Jonke stated that Putnam County's #1 largest beneficiary of a property tax reduction would be the City of New York. He stated it would then be utility companies, municipalities and the State of New York. He stated that the benefit to our residents on a \$1 million property tax levy reduction, on average, would be approximately \$25.00 for the property owner. He believed that we could do both a sales

tax and property tax reduction. He believed that this alternative plan by the County Executive was a reaction to some of the Legislators coming up with a good idea. Legislator Jonke believed that if we worked together, we could cut the sales tax and cut property tax. He stated that it was his idea to cut \$500,000 in property tax in the 2024 and 2025 budgets. He stated that none of us saw any real impact with \$500,000 being cut in each of the two (2) years. He believed that we could do more. He stated that we have an unassigned fund balance of \$90 million with a total fund balance of approximately \$140 million. He explained that the difference accounts for the money to pay for those infrastructure projects mentioned in the County Executive's memorandum. He stated that he did not object to giving money to the towns, but the first thing we needed to do was to stop taking the money from the taxpayers. He stated that nobody has been able to explain to him how vetoing a sales tax cut is good for the taxpayers.

Legislator Addonizio stated that the County Executive's recent proposal to share the 1/9 of 1% sales tax extension was never formally presented to the County Legislature for approval as Legislator Montgomery mentioned. She stated that it was discussed privately with the Town Supervisors, Mayors, and Assembly and Senate Representatives. She stated that the proposed bill has been submitted to Albany. She explained that under Home Rule approval by the County Legislature is needed. She recently proposed allocating \$5 million per year for two (2) years, for a total of \$10 million, from the County's \$90 million fund balance to the nine (9) municipalities using the same population-based formula. She stated that this proposal would have more than doubled the financial benefit to our communities, but it would have been vetoed by our County Executive. She believed that we could absolutely afford to share the 1% sales tax revenue and also return \$5 million to the taxpayers in a meaningful way. She believed this should be a priority moving forward.

Legislator Ellner stated that he did not like the way we got to this point. He believed that these were two (2) mutually exclusive issues that do not need to be handled together. He concurred with Legislator Addonizio regarding giving \$5 million to the towns for two (2) years. He stated that it seems that the towns do not want that and we have this before us. He also concurred with both Legislators Addonizio and Jonke that we could reduce the sales tax extension and reduce the property tax. He explained that he did not like how this proposal was handled. Instead of this being discussed before the Legislature in public, the County Executive bypassed the Legislature and brought it to Albany. He asked counsel if the question could be separated.

Senior Deputy County Attorney Conrad J. Pasquale said, "no." In this particular case we are stuck in the form that it comes from the State. He stated that if you did not want to approve it this form, you would need to vote on it and if it did not pass you could request your State Representatives that they modify it. He stated that at this late date, it is not guaranteed that they will be able to get to it by the deadline.

Legislator Russo stated that she supports this initiative. She stated that she has been out in the public speaking with people every day. She stated that nobody has ever told her that they did not want to pay sales tax or that rate. She stated that she paid a bill right before she came to this meeting and it was a nominal fee. She expressed that she would rather cut property taxes.

Legislator Gouldman stated that we have a choice to keep the sales tax rate the same and set up a system where the County will share a portion of the sales tax revenue with

the towns and villages moving forward. It will be exclusively used for local infrastructure projects and capital improvements. He stated that this option will provide continual financial stability for the County and the municipalities. He explained that if the 1% was not extended, it would lower the sales tax revenue coming into the County for the next few years. He believed that this would put the County in a downward spiral which could put the County in a negative financial situation in the next few years. He stated that it would cost the County approximately \$20 million per year for the next two (2) years. He stated that he would be voting yes to extend the 1% sales tax.

Chairwoman Sayegh stated that we have been discussing the sales tax extension for months and now we are down to the wire. She stated that she supported extending the sales tax but felt that the County could lower the burden to the taxpayers by lowering it by ¼%. She stated that the Legislature approved lowering the sales tax extension by ¼% which would have placed \$5 million back into the pockets of those who pay it, however, it was vetoed by the County Executive. She stated that this led to the historic compromise that extends the full 1% and shares 1/9th of 1% with the towns. She stated that she was not invited to a meeting by the County Executive to discuss that proposal with the towns. She explained that the County already provides \$35 million in shared services to the towns out of the \$80 million sales tax revenue, which includes Board of Election services, Community College, Emergency Services, and making taxes whole for the towns and school districts. She believed that the sales tax extension and sharing with the towns should have been kept separate. She believed that once the amount of the sales tax extension was determined, we then could have discussed the sharing of funding with our towns and villages in a public meeting in Putnam County in this Legislative Conference room, not in Albany. She believed that we were currently pitting the towns against the taxpayers. She believed that we could lower the sales tax extension for the taxpayers, although the County Executive would probably veto that again. She stated that while the towns may receive some form of sharing plan, it is the taxpayer that gets no sales tax relief. She stated that it is the taxpayer that is left out of this historic compromise. She stated that she was elected to serve the taxpayer and believed they deserved a break. She stated that she is not, and never has been, in favor of losing the sales tax extension, but she believed the taxpayers should keep a portion in their pocket. She stated that now we have before us the 1% sales tax extension which includes sales tax sharing with the towns; take it or leave it. She believed it was another unfunded mandate sent down to us from Albany politicians that was negotiated by an Albany politician.

Legislator Montgomery stated that she had hoped to change some of the opinions here. She explained that when she voted against the extension two (2) years ago, this Legislative body including Legislators Jonke, Sayegh, Addonizio and Ellner, voted to extend the 1% sales tax. She stated that it was emphasized how critical it was that the request went through, or it would have an astronomical impact on seniors. She stated that the 2022 budget brought in \$82 million in sales tax revenue; \$16.9 million more than what was budgeted. She stated that the 2024 budget brought in a surplus of approximately \$7 million in sales tax revenue. She stated that it is less than half of the surplus we brought in two (2) years ago. She stated that as of the April 2025 Audit Sales Tax Report, we are on a downward trend, bringing in less than our projected sales tax revenue. She stated that the fund balance is only \$12 million more than what it was two (2) years ago when these Legislators insisted that we needed to vote for the extension. She did not understand what changed for these Legislators. She stated that we have been sitting on a huge fund balance for as long as all of us have been on this Legislature.

She believed what has changed was the significant infrastructure service needs of our towns and villages who struggle much harder year after year to stay under that 2% tax cap and who have to work harder to get FEMA funding. She stated that they do not have the manpower or equipment to do these infrastructure projects, or to recover from the more frequent catastrophic storms. She continued to list items that towns and villages need to fund. She stated that we need to remember to govern responsibly and protect the taxpayers. She believed that we needed to get over the fact that we do not like the way this happened. She stated that we have been united on this issue before and she hoped that we could do what was right in supporting this 1% sales tax extension and sharing to protect our residents.

Legislator Jonke stated that he appreciated everything Legislator Montgomery said. He stated that Legislator Gouldman stated that if we did not adopt the 1% it would cost the taxpayers \$22 million. Legislator Jonke clarified that it is not costing the taxpayers \$22 million, we are receiving \$22 million less revenue. He stated that we have the funds to cover the cost. He proceeded to explain what has changed in the last few years. He stated that when he first became a Legislator eight (8) years ago the County's unassigned fund balance was just shy of \$16 million. He stated that it is now \$90 million: more than five (5) times where it was at. He explained that in 2023 we had a \$78 million fund balance after coming out of COVID-19 when people were home doing more on-line shopping, and it was just after the Wayfair Lawsuit which was settled in 2018 which we started feeling the effects of starting in 2020 as COVID-19 hit. He explained that he voted for the extension in 2023 because we were unsure if the revenue stream would be sustained. He stated that not only has it been sustained, but it has also increased, which he never thought would happen. He explained that in 2022, the Legislature supported the share the growth initiative where ARPA funding and Fund Balance was shared with the towns. He stated that he supported it then and continues to support it today. He stated that Legislator Russo mentioned that a reduction in the sales tax extension would be a nominal amount for residents. He questioned if we reduced the property tax levy by \$1 million, did she know how that would impact her property taxes.

Legislator Russo stated that her point was the sales tax is shared by everybody, not just residents.

Legislator Jonke stated that he reached out to his senior citizens constituents. He stated that they want a reduction in sales tax and property tax. He stated that a \$1 million reduction on the property tax levy would amount to a \$12.00 reduction in property tax for Legislator Russo.

Legislator Russo stated that if we reduced the sales tax extension it would potentially be a \$25.00 savings.

Legislator Jonke stated that the amount would depend on what was purchased. If you purchased a car, it could be a \$200.00 savings. He explained that a slight savings would be seen day after day when something was purchased or you filled your car with gasoline. He stated that none of this is an earth-shattering change. He stated that for Legislator Russo a \$1 million property tax reduction would equate to a property tax savings of \$12.00. He stated that the biggest property taxpayer in Putnam County is New York City. He stated they would save \$35,000. He stated that utility companies would save in the tens of thousands while homeowners would save on average \$25.00. He stated that he wanted to put everything into perspective.

Legislator Crowley stated that when Legislator Jonke was Chairman of the Legislature, she and him went back and forth on the \$500,000 savings which she believed was nothing at a savings of only approximately \$12.00 per household. Legislator Crowley stated that everyone here was elected to serve their constituents, the people that live here in Putnam County, not the people that come here to shop. She stated that, yes, there were other ways where we could do better, and we should do better, but right now this is a start. She explained that everyone has come together and stated that this is what we want. She stated that Legislator Addonizio brought up the proposal of sharing \$5 million with the towns over the next two (2) years for a total of \$10 million. She explained that there was no mechanism in place of how that would be distributed to the towns and villages quarterly like the proposal in front of us. She believed that was why they came together and there was a compromise. She believed it was a good start.

Legislator Addonizio believed that her proposal would have been vetoed by the County Executive and there was no mechanism because one would not be allowed. She believed that we needed to do better and the \$5 million needed to be shared in another way. She believed this needed to be discussed at a different time.

Legislator Ellner stated that in 2023 when he voted for the extension, he stated that he was reluctant to do so because he believed that we needed to start weaning ourselves off the 1% extension. He stated that this is what we have now and what is wanted. He believed that it would pass tonight.

Legislator Gouldman believed that the public should be given the opportunity to speak.

Chairwoman Sayegh stated that we have heard from the public and she believed this would pass tonight. She stated that there are two (2) more meetings this evening, therefore she called for a roll call vote on the resolution and asked if there was a motion to move the resolution.

Legislator Montgomery made a motion to approve the following resolution; seconded by Legislator Ellner.

RESOLUTION #135

HOME RULE REQUEST - REQUESTING THE NEW YORK STATE LEGISLATURE ENACT SENATE BILL S7540A AND ASSEMBLY BILL A8080A

WHEREAS, Putnam County has historically relied on an additional one percent (1%) county sales tax to fund essential public services and infrastructure projects; and WHEREAS, this additional sales tax is currently set to expire on November 30, 2025; and

WHEREAS, Senate Bill S7540A and Assembly Bill A8080A have been introduced in the New York State Legislature to extend this additional one percent (1%) county sales tax for an additional two years, through November 30, 2027; and

WHEREAS, these bills also mandate that one-ninth of the revenue generated from the additional one percent (1%) sales tax be allocated to the towns and villages within Putnam County, distributed based on population, with each municipality guaranteed a minimum annual allocation of \$50,000, to be used exclusively for local infrastructure projects and capital improvements; and

WHEREAS, this revenue-sharing provision represents a historic compromise between the County Executive, Town Supervisors, and Village Mayors, ensuring that all municipalities benefit directly from the sales tax revenue; and

WHEREAS, the extension and equitable distribution of the additional sales tax revenue will provide continued financial stability for the county and its municipalities, enabling the funding of critical infrastructure projects without increasing property taxes; now therefore be it

RESOLVED, that the Putnam County Legislature hereby expresses its strong support for Senate Bill S7540A and Assembly Bill A8080A and respectfully urges the New York State Legislature to enact these bills into law; and be it further

RESOLVED, that the Clerk of the Putnam County Legislature is hereby directed to forward copies of this resolution to the Governor of the State of New York, the Temporary President of the New York State Senate, the Speaker of the New York State Assembly, Senator Peter Harckham, Assemblymember Matthew Slater, Assemblymember Dana Levenberg, and all others deemed necessary and proper.

BY ROLL CALL VOTE: SEVEN AYES. ONE NAY – LEGISLATOR JONKE. ONE ABSTENTION – LEGISLATOR BIRMINGHAM. MOTION CARRIES.

There being no further business, at 6:45 P.M., Chairwoman Sayegh made a motion to adjourn; seconded by Legislator Crowley. All in favor.

The meeting was called to order at 7:00 P.M. by Chairwoman Sayegh who requested Legislator Montgomery lead in the Pledge of Allegiance and Legislator Crowley lead in the Legislative Prayer. Upon roll call, Legislators Montgomery, Gouldman, Addonizio, Russo, Ellner, Jonke, Birmingham, Crowley and Chairwoman Sayegh were present.

PROCLAMATION

Chairwoman Sayegh recognized Legislator Ellner who presented the "World Elder Abuse Awareness Day" proclamation to Director of the Office for Senior Resources Marlene Barrett.

JUNE 15, 2025 AS WORLD ELDER ABUSE AWARENESS DAY

WHEREAS, Older adults deserve to be treated with respect and dignity to enable them to serve as leaders, mentors, volunteers and vital participating members of our communities; and

WHEREAS, in 2006, the International Network for the Prevention of Elder Abuse, in support of the United Nations International Plan of Action, proclaimed a day to recognize the significance of elder abuse as a public health and human rights issue; and

WHEREAS, The National Center on Elder Abuse and the County of Putnam recognize the importance of taking action to raise awareness, prevent and address elder abuse, and its recognition will promote a better understanding of abuse and neglect of older adults by:

- Understanding that ageism and social isolation are major causes of elder abuse.
- Ensuring that proper social structures exist so people can retain community and societal connections, reducing the likelihood of abuse.
- Preventing abuse of older adults through maintaining and improving social supports, like senior centers, human services, and transportation, allowing older adults to continue to live as independently as possible and contribute to the life and vibrancy of our community.

On behalf of the members of the Committee, Legislators Addonizio and Gouldman, Chairman Jonke moved the following:

RESOLUTION #136

APPROVAL – BUDGETARY AMENDMENT (25A038) – FINANCE – VACANCY CONTROL FACTOR 2025

WHEREAS, the Commissioner of Finance has requested a budgetary amendment (25A038) to provide for the Vacancy Control Factor for 2025; and

WHEREAS, the Personnel Committee and the Audit & Administration Committee have reviewed and approved said budgetary amendment; now therefore be it RESOLVED, that the following budgetary amendment be made:

Decrease Estimated Appropriations:

Legislator Jonke explained that we were approving a denial.

Legislator Montgomery explained that the individuals had an agreed amount of a tax assessment and applied for a refund or credit of real property tax. She stated that the Director of Real Property confirmed the error, however it could not be corrected going back beyond three (3) years per NYS Law.

Legislator Jonke stated that there was a stipulated settlement to the reduction of the assessment in 2019. He stated that the assessor did not act on the stipulated reduction, and it took the taxpayer years to discover that the reduction had never gone through. He stated that unfortunately State Law only allows for a refund within the last three (3) years. He explained that the law was a protection for municipalities so if there ever was a refund they could not go back 20 or 30 years.

APPROVAL - SEQR - AGRICULTURAL DISTRICT

WHEREAS, the Department of Agriculture and Markets as Lead Agency for the Agricultural Districts Program has conducted a programmatic review of the environmental effects of Agricultural Districts and has concluded that there is little likelihood of significant adverse environmental impact resulting from the formation or modification of such districts; and

WHEREAS, it is the responsibility of the County to review the site-specific proposals under consideration to determine if unique circumstances exist which increase the likelihood of environmental significance; and

WHEREAS, the Department of Agriculture and Markets recommends that the County Legislative body serve as the Lead Agency to ensure compliance with the requirement of the State Environmental Quality Review Act as it is the only other agency required to undertake an action except for the Department of Agriculture and Markets; now therefore be it

RESOLVED, that the Putnam County Legislature declares itself to be the lead agency to ensure compliance with the requirements of the State Environmental Quality Review Act; and be it further

RESOLVED, that the Putnam County Legislature, as Lead Agency, hereby determines that the site-specific parcels contained in the proposed Agriculture District modifications will not have a significant adverse effect on the environment and that a Draft Environmental Impact Statement will not be prepared; and be it further

RESOLVED, that the Putnam County Legislature, as lead agency, hereby accepts and adopts the Negative Declaration prepared in connection with the proposed Agriculture District modifications, a copy of which is annexed hereto and made a part hereof.

BY POLL VOTE: ALL AYES, CARRIED UNANIMOUSLY.

Item #7b - Approval – Amendment – Inclusion of Parcels in Putnam County Agricultural District – Ridge Ranch was next.

Chairwoman Sayegh explained that it was believed that the acreage amount listed on Resolution #110 of 2025 was incorrect and this proposed resolution was drafted to correct that resolution. However, it was determined after this agenda was posted that Resolution #110 of 2025 was correct. She stated that this proposed resolution was not needed.

APPROVAL – AMENDMENT - INCLUSION OF PARCELS IN PUTNAM COUNTY AGRICULTURAL DISTRICT – RIDGE RANCH

WHEREAS, by Resolution #110 of 2025, the Putnam County Legislature approved a resolution including certain parcels for inclusion in the Agricultural District in the County of Putnam; and

RESOLVED, that this amendment shall be effective *nunc pro tunc* from the date of the original resolution.

Item #7c – Supporting the Adoption of Senate Bill S.1183 & Assembly Bill A.74 by the New York State Legislature to Establish a Real Property Tax Exemption for Veterans who have a One Hundred Percent Service-Connected Disability was next.

Legislator Ellner made a motion to add other business Item #7c to the agenda; seconded by Legislator Birmingham. All in favor.

Legislator Ellner moved the following resolution. He stated that it is in support of a NYS Assembly and Senate bill for a real property tax exemption for veterans who have a 100% service-connected disability. He believed our veterans deserve, particularly those who have become disabled, our respect and excellent treatment. He believed this was one (1) way we could help.

Legislator Crowley stated that this is wonderful, however, she did not believe it was appropriate to do it as other business. She believed that it should be brought through the Committee process for transparency and to allow public discussion.

Legislator Addonizio stated that she supported this bill. She stated that there are so many veterans who are struggling, especially those with a 100% service-connected disability. She explained that many people are not aware that it is hard for them to receive services.

Legislator Montgomery clarified if this is a 100% exemption or similar to what emergency services or fire departments have.

Legislator Ellner stated that he did not recall what the percentage was.

Legislator Montgomery stated that this is just to support the bill. She stated that if the bill passes, which she was in favor of, she believed that the County, towns and school districts and taxing entities in New York State would have to set the exemption rate.

Legislator Jonke stated that veteran's exemptions do not apply to special districts. He stated that the water and fire districts would not be impacted. He stated that he is in favor of sending this to Albany. He stated that if we were ever to consider this exemption if it passes, we should probably do a fiscal analysis of how many exemptions we are talking about and what kind of impact it would have on our overall levy. He stated that what they typically do with veteran exemptions is that they set limits to them. He stated that right now if you have 100% disability as a veteran you get a 50% exemption, but it is limited. He explained that if you have a house that exceeds the limit it might only be a 30% exemption. He stated that it is very complicated.

Legislator Montgomery stated that maybe we could get to work on performing that assessment so we could be ready to implement it when it's time. She explained that many times when the State passes these types of bills it takes towns and counties years to implement them. She stated that she would like to see the veterans get what they deserve.

Legislator Addonizio read part of the "summary of provisions" in the bill stating that there will be a new subdivision added to the real property tax law to allow for a county, city, town, village or school district to implement a resolution of law to provide a full tax exemption to certain disabled veterans.

Legislator Montgomery stated that it is similar to what we did for the fire departments. She stated that she actually went to school board meetings to advocate for them.

Legislator Crowley believed this was wonderful. She questioned if this would supersede what we have.

Legislator Jonke explained that this would probably amend the existing section of the law.

Chairwoman Sayegh stated that she agrees with this in concept and would like to see a full analysis of it. She stated that we are talking about people who have fought for our country and are veterans with 100% disability. She stated that she is in favor of helping them in any way, shape, or form.

Legislator Jonke thanked Legislator Ellner for bringing this forward.

RESOLUTION #166

SUPPORTING THE ADOPTION OF SENATE BILL S.1183 & ASSEMBLY BILL A.74 BY THE NEW YORK STATE LEGISLATURE TO ESTABLISH A REAL PROPERTY TAX EXEMPTION FOR VETERANS WHO HAVE A ONE HUNDRED PERCENT SERVICE-CONNECTED DISABILITY

WHEREAS, Veterans in Putnam County and throughout New York State struggle every day to make ends meet largely due in part to high property taxes; and

WHEREAS, disabilities suffered while serving can leave Veterans unable to work and provide for their families, having sacrificed their health, emotionally, mentally and physically to protect our Country; and

WHEREAS, these Veterans have earned this tax relief to reduce their financial strain, and they deserve to be able to live a comfortable life without any further challenges; and

WHEREAS, the Putnam County Legislature finds that the bills that have been introduced in both the Senate and Assembly will help eliminate some of the financial burden from the Veterans; now therefore be it

RESOLVED, that the Putnam County Legislature hereby supports and urges the adoption of Senate Bill S.1183 and Assembly Bill A.74 amending the real property tax law in relation to establishing a real property tax exemption for veterans who have a one hundred percent service connected disability; and be it further

RESOLVED, that the Clerk of the Legislature is hereby directed to forward copies of this Resolution to Governor Kathy Hochul, Senate Majority Leader Andrea Stewart-Cousins, Assembly Speaker Carl E. Heastie, Senator Peter Harckham, Senator Rob Rolison, Assemblywoman Dana Levenberg, Assemblyman Matthew Slater, and the New York State Association of Counties.

BY ROLL CALL VOTE: ALL AYES. CARRIED UNANIMOUSLY.

Item #8 - Recognition of public on agenda items

Cassandra Roth, Resident of Pawling, asked for clarification on agenda Item #7b - Approval – Amendment – Inclusion of Parcels in Putnam County Agricultural District – Ridge Ranch which was not added to the agenda.

Legislator Ellner explained that there was believed to be a discrepancy of two (2) acres.

Legislative Clerk Schonfeld explained that after the agenda posted the revision, it was determined that the original Resolution #110 of 2025 was correct and no changes needed to be made.

Cassandra Roth questioned the timeline regarding Item #7a – Approval – SEQR – Agricultural District, regarding when it will go to the State and who sends it.

Legislative Clerk Schonfeld explained that after the resolution is processed it will be sent to the County Executive for approval and the Legislative Office will send it to Albany.

Brett Yarris, Resident in the Hamlet of Carmel, thanked Legislator Ellner for bringing forward Item #7c – Supporting the Adoption of Senate Bill S.1183 & Assembly Bill A.74 by the New York State Legislature to Establish a Real Property Tax Exemption for Veterans who have a One Hundred Percent Service-Connected Disability. He stated that there has been discussion about public speaking. He questioned, from a Rules perspective, would this item have qualified as a situation that because it was brought to the Full meeting without going to Committee first the public would have the opportunity to discuss this.

Chairwoman Sayegh stated that the procedure will be discussed at a Rules Committee meeting.

Item #9 – Recognition of Legislators

Legislator Ellner explained that he had the privilege to be a volunteer for the Hudson Valley Honor Flight. He stated that they take veterans on a private chartered flight from either Westchester or Stewart Airports to Washington, DC at no cost to the veteran. He stated that veterans are given priority based on age and the conflict in which they fought. He stated there were approximately 60 veterans with typically one (1) volunteer per veteran. He stated that there were six (6) veterans from Putnam County. He stated that the volunteers pay their own way. He stated that it was a wonderful and very emotional experience. He encouraged people to volunteer.

Legislator Crowley thanked Legislator Ellner for participating. She explained that she too had the opportunity to volunteer a few years ago.

Legislator Montgomery wished all the graduates, from pre-school to individuals getting their doctorate, congratulations and she hoped that they will go out into the world and do great things. She wished everyone a Happy Father's Day.

There being no further business, at 7:49 P.M., Chairwoman Sayegh made a motion to adjourn; seconded by Legislators Crowley and Russo. All in favor.

PUBLIC HEARING ON INCLUSION IN THE AGRICULTURAL DISTRICT HELD BY THE PUTNAM COUNTY LEGISLATURE IN THE HISTORIC COURTHOUSE CARMEL, NEW YORK 10512

<u>Tuesday</u> <u>July 1, 2025</u> 6:45 P.M.

The meeting was called to order at 6:46 P.M. by Chairwoman Sayegh who requested Legislator Montgomery to lead in the Pledge of Allegiance. Upon roll call, Legislators Montgomery, Gouldman, Russo, Ellner, Jonke, Crowley and Chairwoman Sayegh were present. Legislators Addonizio and Birmingham were absent.

Chairwoman Sayegh requested the Clerk read the Public Notice:

BY ORDER OF THE PUTNAM COUNTY LEGISLATURE Diane Schonfeld Clerk

Chairwoman Sayegh read the procedure for making comments at the Public Hearing. She requested that anyone wishing to speak should come up to the microphone, state their name and the town in which they reside. She stated there will be no cross discussion with the members of the Legislature. She stated Legislators will have their opportunity to discuss the applications, before voting on them, at the Full Legislative Meeting following this hearing. She stated if any members of the public have a question, they may leave their name and contact information with the Clerk.

Christine Nastasi, Chair of the Putnam County Agriculture and Farmland Protection Board, stated she wanted to make the Legislature aware that according to the New York State Department of Agriculture and Markets the use of the term "startup farm" is used to determine whether a farm may be eligible for protections under the Agriculture and Markets Law. She stated she sent Legislator Ellner a highlighted form of the definitions and within this form the term "startup farm" is not listed. She stated farms that are requesting to be admitted to the Putnam Agricultural District as commercial boarding facilities must have 10 horses within the calendar year and a minimum of 7 acres. She stated Reinmaker Farm is applying as a real farm and there was no infrastructure or

horses on the farm when the site visit occurred. She stated the Agriculture and Farmland Protection Board voted no for this farm's admittance to the Putnam Agricultural District. She stated for Barn Dog LLC there are two different farms, Barn Dog and Barn Dog 2. She stated Barn Dog 2 is a separate LLC from Barn Dog. She stated even though they have the same principle, they are 2 separate entities. She stated the Agriculture and Farmland Protection Board voted on Barn Dog not Barn Dog 2. She stated Barn Dog did not have horses on the property, they had most of the buildings completed, and in their application they stated they would be ready for occupation by the end of this summer. She reiterated there were no horses on the farm and also no paddocks were built. She stated this was the only vote that was not unanimous and there was some discussion about including Barn Dog in the Agricultural District.

Jamie Spillane, from the Law Office of Hogan, Rossi & Liguori, stated she is an attorney representing Barn Dog LLC and Reinmaker Farm. She stated that with Barn Dog LLC, Chistine Nastasi mentioned there was not a unanimous vote, however, the Agriculture and Farmland Protection Board did vote to include Barn Dog LLC in the Agricultural District. She added the Physical Services Committee also voted to include Barn Dog LLC in the Agricultural District. She stated there is substantial completion of a 42-stall barn on the property as well as a having operation that meets the income requirements which allows the farm to be included in the District even without the 42-stall barn being up and running. She stated that the owner of this property owns two (2) other farms in Putnam County and also owns a parcel in Dutchess County that is a part of an agricultural district. She stated the operation includes commercial boarding and having. She explained how a startup operation can be included in the Agricultural District and how there are protections for startup operations. She stated the purpose of the ownership being in a separate LLC is purely for liability reasons. She stated the Legislature must review every startup operation on an independent basis. She stated she understands Reinmaker Farm was not recommended by the Agriculture and Farmland Protection Board, however, this is essentially a new property being added to an active farm. She stated they have footings installed and the operation is going to be up and running in a couple of months. She stated there was a breeding contract submitted in the application to show the operation has never ceased since moving to this property. She stated the applicant has already obtained the necessary permits and has done everything that is required to continue this active farm operation and there are no violations on the farm.

Lynne Eckardt, Resident of Brewster, stated Barn Dog Farm went through the Town of Southeast Planning Board and Reinmaker Farm has not. She stated she understands that Reinmaker has been operating for a long time, however, she believed that a precedent is set when you approve something prior to it being built which she believed was not a good idea. She stated with White Oak Apiary it resides on 1.14 acres, and she believes there is another parcel in town, however, she is unsure whether it is owned by the same person. She expressed her concern about letting properties that are under the 7-acre minimum into the Agricultural District which would then set a precedent. She was hoping those that get into the District will be an asset to the whole community.

Crystal Stowell, Resident of Putnam Valley, Vice President of the Putnam Valley Grange, stated two (2) weeks ago she discussed with the Legislature the importance of startups being included in the Agricultural District. She stated she specifically spoke about the inclusion of Clara Patunga Farm. She explained that there are two (2) factors that determine the admittance of a farm into the Agricultural District. She explained the two (2) factors; whether the land consists predominantly of viable Agricultural land and

whether its inclusion would serve the public interest. She explained why she believed Clara Patunga Farm meets both of these criteria and should undeniably be included in the Agricultural District. She stated the New York State Department of Agriculture and Markets has provisions for the assessment of startup farm operations. She stated these provisions are expectations that grant farms a reasonable time period to allow them to establish their operation. She explained that for apiaries there is a recommended 2-year startup period and for orchards and berries it is a 3 to 5-year period. She stated all emerging farms would benefit from the inclusion to the Agricultural District because of the protections given by the New York State Department of Agriculture and Markets Law. She explained that the guidance documents contain other factors that should be considered when assessing a startup farm such as the landowner's intent, the time and effort spent on farming, and whether the landowner has the knowledge to build a successful farming business. She stated the owner of Clara Patunga Farm possesses a bachelor's degree in agriculture as well as has valuable farming experience from Green Chimney's Organic Farm. She explained that he has submitted a comprehensive business plan with his application, and she believed he was well equipped with the knowledge, training, experience, and determination to effectively execute his business strategy.

Andrew Jarrett, owner of Lobster Hill Farm in Brewster, stated they were in four (4) farmers markets last year selling their farm's meat and eggs, and three (3) out of the four (4) farmers markets were in Putnam County. He stated this year they are in a total of eight (8) farmers markets between Putnam County and Westchester County. He stated although he respects the towns' concerns about the noises and smells that come from farms, he believed there were ways they can address these issues. He thanked the Legislature and the Community and hoped they were able to see the importance of agriculture in Putnam County.

Ms. Nastasi stated she wanted to clarify that with White Oak Apiary, the owner Micheal Bruen owns land on Gage Road in Brewster, and this is where the majority of his product is held. She stated the property on Brewster Hill Road is considered an add on. She stated add ons are reviewed by the Agricultural District and they are also able to include. She stated with Reinmaker Farm's case, when he sold his property, he no longer had property in the Agricultural District, therefore, Reinmaker Farm's application is not considered an add on and this also applies to Barn Dog LLC.

Jamie Spillane, from the Law Office of Hogan, Rossi & Liguori, clarified the point made by Ms. Nastasi by saying that a farm operation can piggyback on another operation and she proceeded to explain how. She stated that in saying the ownership must be under the same name in order to qualify for admittance to the Agricultural District is inaccurate. She stated an owner can add on property and also be working in an ongoing farm operation with a different entity structure and still be able to apply for the Agricultural District as an operation that is existing and ongoing. She explained that there have been haying operations that lease land from various owners, and the property still qualified. She stated that you can work in conjunction with other farm operations in order to apply and qualify.

Jessica Jarrett, owner of Lobster Hill Farm in Brewster, stated there is a misconception on how the Agricultural District supports farms. She stated inclusion in the Agricultural District does not allow the farms to be exempt from zoning laws, building codes, or

anything that does not deal with farming. She stated it only protects sound farming practices.

Frank Rush, owner of Rush Family Farm in Putnam Valley, thanked the Legislature and the Agriculture and Farmland Protection Board.

Brett Yarris, Resident of Carmel Hamlet, stated the Legislature has an important decision to make. He stated the reason for the existence of the Agriculture and Farmland Protection Board is to serve as an advisory body. He stated the Legislature can utilize this board's information and advice to determine what farms they should approve.

There being no further comments; at 7:23 P.M., Chairwoman Sayegh made a motion to adjourn; seconded by Legislator Jonke. All in favor.



Legislator Gouldman believed that changing this to two (2) years was discussed in Committee.

Senior Deputy County Attorney Conrad Pasquale explained that it was discussed and the period of five (years) was changed to two (2) years in Section 220-66(E).

Legislator Jonke explained that Putnam County already had the exemption. This was to exempt those individuals who are volunteers residing outside of the municipality.

Legislator Montgomery stated that she was in full support of this. She stated that EMS is not essential anywhere in New York State. She stated that there is a packet of bills before the State Legislature to make it essential. She stated that this is a small measure in support for our Fire and EMS workers. She stated that we have a long way to go to continue this work.

Legislator Gouldman explained that volunteerism in Putnam County and throughout New York State in the Ambulance Corps. and Fire Departments have decreased. He believed that anything we could do to encourage volunteerism for these departments is very helpful. He explained that without these volunteers there would be a substantial cost to the towns and County in having paid departments 24/7.

Chairwoman Sayegh explained that these volunteers need to go through extensive training to be certified and recertified, frequently at their own expense. She stated that the purpose of this exemption is to maintain the ranks of the volunteer corps. and encourage individuals to join.

RESOLUTION #177

A LOCAL LAW TO AMEND CHAPTER 220, ARTICLE X, ENTITLED "EXEMPTION FOR QUALIFIED MEMBERS OF VOLUNTEER FIRE DEPARTMENTS AND AMBULANCE CORPS"

Be it enacted by the Legislature of the County of Putnam as follows:

<< PUTNAM COUNTY CODE CHAPTER 220>>

<<ARTICLE X>>

Section 1.

Section 220-65 of the Putnam County Code is hereby amended to read as follows:

§ 220-65. Legislative intent.

Chapter 670 of the Laws of 2022 added a new § 466-a to the Real Property Tax Law, repealing prior §§ 466-a through 466-k, though continuing the exemption provided therein. Section 466-a provides a real property tax exemption of 10% for qualified members of volunteer fire departments and ambulance corps statewide, subject to adoption by individual municipalities. Members of volunteer fire departments and ambulance corps provide valuable services to the people of Putnam County. In order to be certified and recertified, such volunteers must undertake numerous hours of training on their own time and frequently at their own expense. The purpose of this exemption is to maintain the ranks of the volunteer corps and encourage volunteers to join. In 2024, §466-1 was added, which allows the exemption to be extended to volunteers who provide such services to a neighboring city, village, or town. The enabling legislation enacted by the State Legislature requires that localities must adopt a local law in order to afford those volunteers such exemption.

Section 2.

Section 220-66 of the Putnam County Code is hereby amended to read as follows:

§ 220-66. Applicability.

Such exemption shall not be granted to an enrolled member of an incorporated volunteer fire company, fire department, or incorporated voluntary ambulance service residing in such county unless:

- A. The applicant resides in a city, town, or village in Putnam County:
- B. The property is the primary residence of the applicant:
- C. The property is used exclusively for residential purposes; provided, however, that in the event any portion of such property is not used exclusively for the applicant's residence but is used for other purposes, such portion shall be subject to taxation and the remaining portion only shall be entitled to the exemption provided by this section; and
- D. The applicant serves as a member of a volunteer fire company, fire department, or incorporated voluntary ambulance service that is located in and provides service to any city, village, or town in Putnam County;
- E. The applicant has been certified by the authority having jurisdiction for the incorporated volunteer fire company, fire department, or voluntary ambulance service as an enrolled member of such incorporated volunteer fire company, fire department, or voluntary ambulance service for a period of two years of service;
- F. The applicant must file a certificate from his or her qualifying organization that he or she is an enrolled member. Such certification of membership must certify that the member received credit under a service award program defined by Article 11-A, 11-AAA, or 11-AAAA of the General Municipal Law for the period of service claimed in the application.

Section 3.

Section 220-67 of the Putnam County Code is hereby amended to read as follows:

§ 220-67. Continuation of eligibility requirements.

The applicant shall maintain continual eligibility for the exemption by being a continuously active member of the incorporated volunteer fire company, fire department, fire district, or incorporated ambulance service. An active member shall meet the requirements for active service as defined by each company, department, or corporation. Annual attestation by such company, district, or corporation is required to maintain this exemption.

Section 4.

Section 220-68 of the Putnam County Code is hereby amended to read as follows:

§ 220-68. Lifetime exemption.

Any enrolled member of an incorporated volunteer fire company, fire department, or incorporated voluntary ambulance service who accrues more than 20 years of active service and is so certified by the authority having jurisdiction for the incorporated

volunteer fire company, fire department, or incorporated voluntary ambulance service shall be granted the 10% exemption as authorized by this article for the remainder of his or her life as long as his or her primary residence is located within such County.

Section 5.

Section 220-69 of the Putnam County Code is hereby amended to read as follows:

§ 220-69. Unremarried spouses of volunteer firefighters or volunteer ambulance workers killed in line of duty.

An exemption granted under this article shall be continued, and a preexisting exemption shall be reinstated, where the exemption was previously claimed by an enrolled member of an incorporated volunteer fire company, fire department, or incorporated voluntary ambulance service, to such deceased enrolled member's unremarried spouse if such member is killed in the line of duty; provided, however, that:

- A. Such unremarried spouse is certified by the authority having jurisdiction for the incorporated volunteer fire company, fire department, or incorporated voluntary ambulance service as an unremarried spouse of an enrolled member of such incorporated volunteer fire company, fire department, or incorporated voluntary ambulance service who was killed in the line of duty; and
- B. Such deceased volunteer had been an enrolled member for at least five years; and
- C. Such deceased volunteer had been receiving the exemption prior to his or her death.

Section 6.

Section 220-69.1 of the Putnam County Code is hereby amended to read as follows:

§ 220-69.1. Unremarried spouses of deceased volunteer firefighters or volunteer ambulance workers.

An exemption granted under this article shall be continued, and a preexisting exemption shall be reinstated, to an unremarried spouse of a deceased enrolled member of an incorporated volunteer fire company, fire department, or incorporated voluntary ambulance service; provided, however, that:

- A. Such unremarried spouse is certified by the authority having jurisdiction for the incorporated volunteer fire company, fire department, or incorporated voluntary ambulance service as an unremarried spouse of a deceased enrolled member of such incorporated volunteer fire company, fire department, or incorporated voluntary ambulance service; and
- B. Such deceased volunteer had been an enrolled member for at least 20 years; and
- C. Such deceased volunteer and unremarried spouse had been receiving the exemption for such property prior to the death of such volunteer.

Section 7.

Section 220-69 .2 of the Putnam County Code is hereby amended to read as follows:

§ 220-69.2. Application for exemption.

- A. Application for such exemption, along with the certificate of membership defined above, shall be filed with the applicable town assessor on or before the taxable status date on a form as prescribed by the Commissioner of the Office of Real Property Tax Services.
- B. Certification shall be required for any period of time claimed by an applicant that is not already on file with the applicable town assessor.
- C. The assessor shall review the application and certification to ensure they have satisfied the requirements of this law.

Section 8.

Section 220-69.3 of the Putnam County Code is hereby added as follows:

§220-69.3. Continuation of exemption.

No applicant who is a volunteer firefighter or volunteer ambulance worker who by reason of such status is receiving any benefit under the provisions of this article on the effective date of this article shall suffer any diminution of such benefit because of the provisions of this section. Any exemption under Article X of Chapter 220, as added by L.L. No. 1 of 2003, shall be considered the same and equivalent to the exemption available under this article.

Section 9.

This local law shall take effect immediately upon the filing with the secretary of state.

WHEREAS, the County of Putnam ("County") is a direct recipient of FTA funding and/or financial assistance and, as such, must comply with FTA rules and regulations, more particularly, as set forth in 49 C.F.R. Part 673 et seq. ("Final Rule"); and

WHEREAS, the Final Rule requires that recipients of FTA grant funds and/or financial assistance under 49 U.S.C. Sec. 5307 that operate a public transportation system must develop a Public Transportation Agency Safety Plan ("Safety Plan") that includes the processes and procedures necessary for implementing Safety Management Systems ("SMS"); and

WHEREAS, the SMS components of the Safety Plan include, without limitation, safety management policy, safety risk management, safety assurance, and safety promotion; and

WHEREAS, the Bipartisan Infrastructure Law amends FTA's final rule under 49 U.S.C. Sec. 5329(d)(5) to require recipients receiving Section 5307 funding and serving an urbanized area greater than 200,000 to establish a Safety Committee. As such, the County will continue to utilize MV Transportation's previously established Committee consisting of three management and three frontline employee representatives; and

WHEREAS, in September 2024, FTA published General Directive 24-1 which requires transit agencies as part of their Safety Plan to conduct a safety risk assessment related to assaults on transit workers using the Safety Management System (SMS) processes, identify safety risk mitigations or strategies necessary as a result of the safety risk assessment; and provide information to FTA on how they are assessing, mitigating, and monitoring the safety risk associated with assaults on transit workers; and

WHEREAS, the County, as a transit operator, is required to certify annually that it has developed/updated its Safety Plan and such Plan meets all of the requirements of the Final Rule; and

WHEREAS, the County, by and through the Department of Planning, Development and Public Transportation, in furtherance of the objectives of 49 C.F.R. Part 673 *et seq.*, has drafted its Safety Plan pursuant to the Final Rule, such Safety Plan attached hereto as Exhibit "A;" now therefore be it

Item #6q - Approval – Inclusion of Parcels in Putnam County Agricultural District was next. On behalf of the members of the Physical Services Committee, Legislators Crowley and Jonke, Legislator Ellner brought forward the following:

Legislator Ellner requested the resolution be divided to vote on the seven applicants approved by the Putnam County Agriculture and Farmland Protection Board first.

Chairwoman Sayegh suggested dividing the question into the seven applicants approved by the Putnam County Agriculture and Farmland Protection Board, and the other two (2) recommendations approved by the Physical Services Committee separately, Clara Patunga Farm and Reinmaker Farm.

Legislator Ellner concurred.

Legislator Jonke stated that his first seven (7) years on the Legislature he voted for every single parcel that was recommended. He stated that last year there was a discussion about prime soils. He stated that because it seemed that there was a rule we needed to follow, he voted against properties getting into the Agricultural District. He stated that the Legislature learned that this was not really the case, therefore, he would be voting for these parcels.

Chairwoman Sayegh read the names of the following farms recommended for inclusion by the Putnam County Agriculture and Farmland Protection Board: Bowen Farm, LLC., Lobster Hill Farm, Big Red Barn Farm, Cucumber Hill Farm, The Rush Family Farm, Bardon LLC., and White Oak Apiary.

By Poll Call Vote: All Ayes. Legislators Addonizio and Birmingham were absent. Motion Carries.

Chairwoman Sayegh explained that we will now vote on the remaining two (2) farms approved at the Physical Services Committee that were not recommended by the Putnam County Agriculture and Farmland Protection Board. She stated that the first we will consider is Clara Patunga Farm.

Legislator Ellner questioned Counsel if there was a minimum acreage requirement.

Senior Deputy County Attorney Pasquale did not believe there was an acreage requirement based on the research he has done. He stated that there are certain sections of the Agriculture & Markets Law that pertain to acreage requirements as well as cumulative sales, especially within the first several years of operation. However, it did not speak to eligibility of the parcel to be in the Agricultural District, but more to other certain benefits that are covered under the law.

Legislator Crowley explained that the eight (8) year review will be coming up which would give us two (2) years to inspect the startup farms to make sure they are doing what is expected. It would also pertain to all farms, not just the new ones we are including that just happen to be within the two (2) year period.

Legislator Montgomery explained that although she is not a farmer, she is an advocate for farming. She stated that she trusts in the process of the Agriculture and Farmland Protection Board. She stated that last year she deferred to them and voted for all the farms that the Agriculture and Farmland Protection Board recommended. She explained that this farm was not recommended by the Board, but that does not mean they cannot farm or apply next year. She explained that she tends to vote in favor of what is recommended by the Advisory Boards and that is the reason why she asks for so much information on the people being appointed to the Boards.

Legislator Jonke explained that based on the information received during the Physical Services Committee meeting, he would be voting not to include this property.

Legislator Russo thanked the volunteers on the Putnam County Agriculture and Farmland Protection Board on behalf of the County for their hard work in doing the site visits on the parcels requested for inclusion. She believed that this farm could wait another before being considered based on the Board's recommendation not to include them.

Legislator Montgomery believed that the farmers are experienced, and the farm will be very viable in the future. She explained that the parcel was in her district, and she was hoping to see it succeed.

Legislator Gouldman believed that farming was in their blood and that these farmers were experienced in growing crops. He stated that they live in Putnam Valley, and he would be supporting this farm.

Chairwoman Sayegh stated that she would defer to the Putnam County Agriculture and Farmland Protection Board and their expertise. She stated that she does not deny the potential of the farm or that it would not be a great operation in the future, but she did not support their inclusion at this time.

Chairwoman Sayegh called for a Roll Call Vote on the inclusion of Clara Patunga Farm.

By Roll Call Vote: Two Ayes – Legislators Crowley and Gouldman. Five Nays – Legislators Ellner, Jonke, Montgomery, Russo and Chairwoman Sayegh. Legislators Addonizio and Birmingham were absent. Motion Fails.

Chairwoman Sayegh explained that Reinmaker Farm will be the next farm to consider.

Legislator Montgomery wanted everyone to be aware that this does not mean that Reinmaker Farm cannot farm; they can. She stated that this was a parcel not recommended by the Putnam County Agriculture and Farmland Protection Board for various reasons. She appreciated Mr. Lepler's experience and dedication to farming in Putnam County, however she was not comfortable going against the recommendation of the Board.

Legislator Jonke stated that he would be voting in favor of this. He stated that it is an operation that has been in place for 40 years. He stated that there was a transfer of the property into another ownership and Mr. Lepler is recreating his property. He stated that construction is well underway.

Chairwoman Sayegh explained that she would follow the recommendation of the Board. She explained that the infrastructure was not in place at the time the Board toured the property. She understands that it will be in place by the end of the summer, however there is an inclusion period for a reason. She believed it would start a dangerous precedence if the inclusion was based on what someone said they were going to do on the property. She encouraged him to reapply next year.

Chairwoman Sayegh called for a Roll Call Vote on the inclusion of Reinmaker Farm.

She congratulated all the candidates who won the Primary. She hoped in the future we could have campaigns that we can all be proud of as Americans.

There being no further business, at 8:31 P.M., Chairwoman Sayegh made a motion to adjourn; seconded by Legislator Jonke. All in favor.

Director McLoughlin has dutifully served in the position as Putnam County Director of Real Property Tax Services since her appointment in June 2023 whereby she served for the remainder of the term after Director Lisa Johnson retired.

Director McLoughlin has greatly improved functions in the Division of Real Property Tax Services during her term of service. Under her leadership, Putnam County's Division of Real Property Tax Services has instituted new policies and procedures for assessments to increase efficiency and accuracy. Director McLoughlin has reduced printing in office and printing in general, switching certain documents to an electronic format, and the Division has generated thousands of dollars in new revenue for the County by charging vendors for file transfers for the first time.

The Division has also made several technology-related improvements to further increase its efficiency, such as fully digitizing their records on their website. The Division will be rolling out a new website imminently which will include an improved parcel data search and updated mapping, making all property searches easier for the user. Another initiative by Director McLaughlin has been outreach and increased communication between the County and municipalities, with the goal of improving various property-related functions, such as alerting 911 of new development and roads. Finally, Putnam is in the running as a test County for the State's RPS online system.

As Director McLoughlin was qualified by N.Y.S. Office of Real Property Tax Services in 2023, she does not need to be requalified and meets the standards for the position as set forth in applicable law and enclosed herein.

Director McLoughlin's new full, six-year (6) term would begin on October 1, 2025, pursuant to N.Y.S. Real Property Tax Law §1530(1).

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





WHEREAS, in 2024 when creating the 2025 Tentative Budget, the County Executive met with all of the Outside Agencies who requested funding; and

WHEREAS, when the 2025 Tentative Budget was presented to the Putnam County Legislature, the County Executive placed \$75,000 in subcontingency for the Outside Agencies for the Legislature to distribute in the 2025 fiscal year, rather than allocating the funds based on his meetings with the organizations; and

WHEREAS, CAREERS Support Solutions (CAREERS) requested funding from the County for the first time in 2023 in the amount of \$30,000 and was granted \$15,000 in both 2023 and 2024; and

WHEREAS, Executive Director Tina Cornish-Lauria of CAREERS appeared at the February 19, 2025 Rules, Enactments & Intergovernmental Relations Committee meeting to discuss the role CAREERS serves in the County and to request an additional \$15,000 in funding; and

WHEREAS, CAREERS has been operating in Putnam County for 36 years, working with clients with disabilities, most of whom are Putnam County residents with mental impairment; and

WHEREAS, the County funding is used toward helping residents with physical and mental disabilities with job skills, placing them in jobs, finding paid internships for students, providing job assistance, and other means of support; and

WHEREAS, the amount now being requested by CAREERS breaks down to approximately \$12.50 per client per month; and

WHEREAS, without the additional funding, CAREERS would be able to help fewer Putnam County residents; and

WHEREAS, the Legislature was tasked with distributing the \$75,000 placed in subcontingency by the County Executive without the benefit of the informational meetings the Administration had in preparation for the 2025 budget and, as a result, Outside Agencies such as CAREERS are facing critical hardships due to the lack of funding; and

WHEREAS, the current funds held in subcontingency are meant to support organizations in exactly these circumstances; now therefore be it

RESOLVED, the Rules, Enactments & Intergovernmental Relations Committee, after due consideration, finds that CAREERS provides an invaluable service to some of the most vulnerable population of the County, all of whom would suffer greatly if CAREERS could no longer maintain its staff or services provided due to budgetary constraints; and be it further

- A. All committee meetings shall include a designated period for public comment prior to any votes being taken on agenda items. This public comment period shall be structured in a manner that is consistent, fair, and efficient, with a time limit for individual comments to ensure that all individuals wishing to speak are given an opportunity to do so.
- B. If a draft resolution or local law has not gone through the committee process but is being requested to be considered at a regular or special full legislative meeting as either a pre-filed request pursuant to Rule 5(A)(9) or as new business pursuant to Rule 5(A)(10), and following a procedural vote as to whether such resolution should be placed before the County Legislature for consideration, there shall be a designated period for public comment on the substance of such resolution prior to any votes being taken on such resolution. This public comment period shall be structured in a manner that is consistent, fair, and efficient, with a time limit for individual comments to ensure that all individuals wishing to speak are given an opportunity to do so.
- C. To the extent possible, the Chair of each full legislative meeting or committee meeting shall notify the public in advance of the meeting agenda and the designated time for public comment, providing reasonable access for the public to attend and participate in the meeting; and
- D. Any member of the public who wishes to speak during the recognition of the public on agenda items shall be given a fair opportunity to present their views, consistent with the Rules of Order and Procedure of the County Legislature.

- a) Following such referral, and prior to the date of said Standing Committee meeting, the appointee shall provide the following to such Standing Committee in connection with such Committee review:
 - a written professional resume;
 - three (3) written references from persons engaged in the professional area of expertise to which the appointee is being considered to be maintained under confidential cover, not to be released to the public, pursuant to Public Officers Law §89(2)(b)(i);
 - a signed document stating whether such appointee has any interest* in any contract* with the County. (*as such terms are defined in Article 18 of the New York State General Municipal Law).
- b) The Standing Committee to which such appointment has been referred shall conduct a committee meeting to interview said appointee.
- c) At the conclusion of said Standing Committee meeting, said Standing Committee shall adopt a resolution to be prefiled at a subsequent meeting of the County Legislature stating one of the following three (3) results: 1- approve appointment, 2- disapprove appointment or 3- no recommendation.

ADOPTION of LEGISLATIVE MANUAL

I. FUNCTIONS OF THE LEGISLATURE:

As provided by the Putnam County Charter II, Section 2.04, the Putnam County Legislature shall be the legislative, appropriating, and policy-determining body of the County. Except as may be otherwise provided in the Charter, it shall have and exercise all the legislative powers and duties now or hereafter conferred or imposed upon it by the Charter or by State Law, together with all the powers and duties necessarily implied or incidental thereto.

Under the Charter, the County Legislature shall have the following powers and duties, but is not necessarily limited to them:

- A. To adopt by resolution all necessary rules and regulations for its conduct and procedure.
- B. To make appropriations, levy taxes, incur indebtedness, and adopt the County budget.
- C. To exercise all powers of local legislation in relation to enacting, amending or rescinding local laws, Putnam County Charter provisions, legalizing acts or resolutions.
- D. To adopt, amend and repeal by local law, an Administrative Code which shall set forth the details of the administration of County government consistent with the provisions of the Charter.
- E. To confirm, when required, the appointments made by the County Executive according to the procedure cited in Section 2.08 of Article II of the Charter.
- F. To create, alter, combine, or abolish by local law, County administrative units not headed by elected officials or not otherwise provided by law.
- G. To fix by resolution the compensation of all officers and employees paid from County funds, except members of the judiciary; except that the compensation of any elected official paid from County funds shall not be decreased during that official's term.
- H. To fix by resolution the compensation to be paid from County funds for persons who are rendering services to, or in behalf of, the County, but who are not officers or employees of the County.
- I. To make, or cause to be made, such studies, audits and investigations as it deems to be in the interest of the County, and in connection therewith to obtain professional and technical advice, appoint temporary advisory boards of citizens, subpoena witnesses, administer oaths and require the production of books, papers and other evidence deemed necessary.
- J. To fix the amount of bonds of officers and employees paid from County funds.
- K. To designate one or more newspapers published within the County for the publication of all enactments, notices and other matters required by law.
- L. To establish or abolish positions of employment and titles thereof.
- M. To fill vacancies in any elective County offices, except the judiciary, in accordance with the Charter and other applicable law.

- N. To designate one or more depositories for the deposit of all monies received by the Commissioner of Finance.
- O. To fix, during the annual budget process, the salaries of its members for the succeeding year.
- P. To determine and make provision for any matter of County government not otherwise provided for.
- Q. To confirm appointments, except as otherwise provided by the Charter, through the affirmative vote of a majority of the entire Legislature taken at a regular or special meeting. In the event the Legislature has neither confirmed nor rejected an appointment within sixty (60) days after such appointment has been filed with the Clerk of the Legislature, such appointment shall be deemed confirmed.
- R. The Legislature shall provide annually an independent audit of its accounts, transactions of the County and of every County department, office and agency. The audit shall be made by a qualified accountant or accounting firm, so designated by the Legislature, which has no personal interest, directly or indirectly, in the affairs of the County or any of its departments, officers or agencies.
- S. If any section of this Legislative Manual, which is the official guide to the procedures of the legislature, is adjudged by a Court of competent jurisdiction to be in conflict with any Federal or State Statute or with the Putnam County Charter, then said section shall be deemed null and void, "ab initio," but this shall not affect any other section, other than that particular section of this Manual so adjudged to be in conflict as aforedescribed.

II. ORGANIZATION OF THE LEGISLATURE:

A. Size and Districts:

The Putnam County Legislature shall be organized into nine single-member districts as established and provided for by Local Law #3 of 1977, establishing a County Legislature and approved by the voters of Putnam County in a referendum on November 8, 1977. Each member shall have one vote. Current maps of all County Legislative Districts and election districts shall be on file at all times in the Office of the Clerk of the Legislature for the use of Legislators and other interested persons.

B. Meetings of the Legislature:

1. Organizational Meeting of the Legislature:

The County Legislature shall, on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in January of each year, or as soon thereafter as practicable, meet and organize by election from among its members, a Chair, Deputy Chair and such other legislative officials as it deems appropriate. The Chair shall appoint members of the County Legislature to serve on such legislative committees as are provided by the rules of the County Legislature. The County Clerk shall serve as Chair until such time as the County Legislature itself elects a chair. The date, time and place of said meeting of the Legislature shall be fixed by Resolution the proceeding December.

a. Notice of the Organizational Meeting:

The notice of the Organization Meeting stating the date, time, and place shall be written and placed in the legislative mailbox of each legislator or mailed to the last known address of each Legislator by the Clerk of the Legislature at least five (5) days prior to the meeting. In the event of incapacity or the failure of The Clerk of the Legislature to act, the notice shall be served by the Putnam County Clerk.

b. Call to Order:

The Putnam County Clerk shall convene the Organizational Meeting and call it to order and shall serve as Chair until such time as the County Legislature elects a Chair.

c. Election of a Chair of the Legislature:

The first order of business shall be the election of a Chair of the Legislature to serve a one-year term expiring on December 31st of the year of that election. The Chair shall be elected by a majority of the entire Legislature. Upon election, the Chair shall assume that office and preside for the balance of the Organizational Meeting and over all other meetings of the Legislature. This procedure is prescribed in Section 2.05, Article II of the Putnam County Charter.

d. Appointment of the Clerk of the Legislature:

Effective January 1, 2002, the County Legislature shall, on the first day of January or as soon thereafter as practicable, and every three years thereafter, appoint a Clerk, who shall serve until his or her successor is appointed. From time to time the Clerk shall appoint such additional personnel as are required for the efficient operation of the office of the Clerk within the appropriations approved therefore. This procedure is set forth in Section 2.06 of Article II of the Putnam County Charter. In the event of a vacancy in the office of Chair of the Legislature, during this Organizational Meeting, the Putnam County Clerk, acting as Chair under the Charter and Rules of the Putnam County Legislature shall appoint a Clerk of the Legislature pro-tem, to serve until such time as the position can be filled according to this paragraph (d).

e. Appointment of the Auditor:

Effective January 1, 2001, the County Legislature shall on the first day of January or as soon thereafter as practicable, and every three years thereafter, appoint an Auditor who shall serve until his or her successor is appointed. This procedure is set for in Section 2.10 of the Putnam County Charter.

f. Adoption of the Legislative Manual:

The next order of business shall be the annual adoption of the Legislative Manual including any amendments incorporated therein. This Manual is the official guide to the rules, proceedings and practices of the Putnam County Legislature. The rules of the County

Legislature for the preceding year shall remain in force and effect at the first meeting of each year until the formal adoption of the rules for the current year.

g. Establishment of the Legislative Calendar:

A Legislative Calendar shall be adopted, setting the dates and times of all Regular Meetings for the Calendar Year, which calendar shall then be published.

2. Regular Meetings of the Legislature:

Regular meetings of the Putnam County Legislature shall be held monthly at 7:00 PM on the first Tuesday, except when a holiday falls on the regularly scheduled date, the meeting shall be held on the next business day, unless the Legislature decides otherwise. The Clerk of the Putnam County Legislature shall place in the legislative mailbox of each legislator_or mail to each member of the Legislature, a written notice stating the date, time and place of each meeting at least five (5) days prior to the date of the meeting. Said agenda shall state the subject matter of all resolutions and local laws to be voted on at such meeting. (Article IV, Rules 26).

3. Special Meetings of the Legislature:

The Special Meetings shall be held at the call of the Clerk of the Legislature upon direction of the Chair and four other Legislators or upon written request signed by a majority of the entire Legislature. Notice in writing stating date, time, place and purpose of the Special Meeting, shall be placed in_the legislative mailbox of each legislator. Supplemental notification shall be by U.S. Mail, e-mail, facsimile or other reasonable means of communication or as requested by any Legislator in writing to the Clerk of the Legislature to each member of the Legislature by the Clerk of the Legislature. (Section IV, Rule 27)

4. Recessed and Adjourned Meetings of the Legislature:

Except while a vote is being taken, any meeting of the Legislature or of its committees or commissions, may be recessed or adjourned at any time upon approval of a majority of those present. Such motion shall be decided without debate. Additionally, if any meeting extends beyond 11:00 PM, it shall be terminated under these Rules unless a majority of the members present vote to continue. Any meeting, which is recessed, shall be re-convened at a future date and time approved by a majority of those present at the meeting being recessed. A recessed meeting shall be considered a continuing meeting and only matters on the agenda of the recessed meeting shall be discussed when it is re-convened. This re-convened meeting shall be noticed by the Clerk in accord with procedures outlined in, (Section IV, Rule 28) ("Special Meetings"). Any meeting which is adjourned shall be considered a terminated meeting and any unresolved items at the adjournment shall be considered unfinished

business. Those unresolved items shall be made part of the next regularly scheduled meeting of the Legislature or of its Committees and shall be listed under Unfinished Business according to the procedures under Article IV, Rule 5 (a) (6).

C. Powers and Duties of the Chair of the Legislature:

The Chair of the Putnam County Legislature shall have all the powers and shall perform all the duties conferred on that office by the Charter, Administrative Code, Legislative Manual, as well as applicable County and Municipal Law. Among the powers and duties of the Chair, but not by the way of limitation, shall be the following:

1. To preside at meetings of the Legislature:

The Chair shall preside at all regular and special meetings of the Legislature; shall preserve order and decorum; and shall decide all questions of order subject to appeal by a majority of the members present. The Chair shall be guided by the Rules of Order and Procedure of the Legislature, as adopted as part of the Legislative Manual.

2. To Appoint Standing Committees:

The Chair shall, within thirty (30) days of his or her selection as Chair, appoint from among the membership of the Legislature the members and Chairs of the following Standing Committees of the Legislature:

Audit and Administration
Budget and Finance
Economic Development and Energy
Health, Social and Educational Services/Environmental
Personnel
Physical Services
Protective Services
Rules, Enactments and Intergovernmental Relations

The Chair may be self-appointed to membership with full voting rights to One (1) Standing Committee and may serve as Chair of that Standing Committee in addition to Budget and Finance. All appointments made hereunder pursuant to this paragraph shall not require consent of the legislature. Not withstanding the foregoing, the Chair may be self-appointed to one or more additional Standing Committees, with full voting rights, only upon the approval of a majority of the entire Legislature. In addition, the Chair shall serve as an exofficio, non-voting member of the remaining Standing Committees.

3. To appoint Special Committees and Legislative Officers:

Upon authorization by a majority of the entire Legislature in each instance, the Chair may appoint such special committees, sub-committees, commissions and Legislative Officers as, in the opinion of the Legislature, is necessary to facilitate the conduct of its business. The Chair shall be ex-officio member of each special committee.

4. <u>To serve as a member of the Capital Projects Committee</u> as defined In Article VII, Section 7.05, number 3 of the Putnam County Charter.

5. To Perform Administrative Duties:

The Chair shall serve as the Administrative Head of the Legislature and shall be responsible for the conduct of its business and shall exercise administrative supervision over the office of the Clerk of the Legislature and of the Auditor, acting as liaison between these two offices and the Legislature.

6. To designate an Acting County Executive:

If no Acting County Executive has been so designated by the County Executive, or if the person designated by the County Executive is unable to serve during the absence or disability of the County Executive, the Chair of the County Legislature shall designate the head of one of the County Administrative units to perform such duties. This is provided for in Article III, Section 3.05 of the Putnam County Charter.

7. To Have the Power to Vote:

The Chair shall, in all cases, have the right to vote, except on appeals to the Legislature from decisions of the Chair. On all other questions, when the vote, including the vote of the Chair, is equally divided, the question shall be defeated.

8. Legislature Control:

In all cases, unless otherwise stated by State Statute, local ordinance, Legislative Manual, or by the Putnam County Charter herein, all appointments by the Chair shall be subject to a majority vote of the entire Legislature.

D. Temporary Chair:

In the case of the absence of the Chair, the Deputy Chair shall preside as described under Article IV, Rule 6.

E. Vacancy in the Chair:

If the Chair of the Legislature resigns, dies, is declared incompetent by a Court of competent jurisdiction, is removed or is removed from the Chair by censure, the Legislature shall meet within seven (7) days, at a special or regular meeting and vote among their members to elect a Chair to fill the existing vacancy. Such Chair shall serve until the next Organizational Meeting.

F. Censure of the Chair:

Any Legislator may introduce a motion censuring and/or requesting a "vote of no confidence," specifically citing the action of the Chair for which vote is requested. A 2/3 vote of the entire Legislature is required for this action. If said motion passes, a 2/3 vote by the Legislature shall then be taken to sanction or remove the Chair.

G. Censure of a Legislator:

Any Legislator may introduce a motion censuring another Legislator, specifically citing the action of the Legislator for which the vote is requested. A 2/3 vote of the entire Legislature is required for this action. If said motion passes, the Chair shall be responsible for instituting an appropriate sanction designated by a 2/3 vote of the Legislature.

H. *Powers and Duties of the Clerk of the Legislature*:

The Clerk of the Legislature shall have all the powers and duties now or hereafter conferred or imposed by the Putnam County Charter and the Administrative Code or approved by the Legislature. In addition, as Chief of Staff to the Legislature, the Clerk shall furnish, research and investigate and give clerical support to the Legislature and its constituent parts. The Clerk, at the direction of the Chair of the Legislature, shall also prepare and transmit to the State Legislature, the County Legislature's official views regarding any proposals and bills before it which are of interest to the County, as reflected by the resolution of the County Legislature.

1. The statutory duties of the Clerk include, but are not limited to, the following:

- a. To appoint such personnel as are required and authorized by the Legislature within the appropriations therefor.
- b. To Prepare and circulate an agenda for all Regular, Special and Committee Meetings of the Legislature, as follows:
 - 1. A list of all unfinished business and special orders.
 - 2. A list stating the subject matter of all resolutions, ordinances and local laws to be voted on at such meeting.
 - 3. Copies of all text of all local laws and resolutions to be introduced or to be voted on at each meeting.

All of the above shall be placed in each legislator's legislative mailbox or mailed to each Legislator at least five (5) days before each meeting. In order to accomplish this, the text of each resolution, ordinance, or local law to appear on the agenda, shall be received by the Clerk at least seven (7) days before the meeting. Local laws shall be received by the Clerk at least ten (10) days before the meeting and copies forwarded to each legislator in compliance with Section 20 (4) of the Municipal Home Rule Law.

c. To attend or to designate an authorized person to attend all meetings of the Legislature and its Committees and to make a record of the official proceedings. Minutes of all Legislature and Committee meetings, or of any other meeting or hearing called or otherwise authorized by the Legislature or by any of its duly authorized Committees or Commissions, and if the

Legislature creates such a body it is responsible for the minutes which shall consist of a recordation of:

- 1. The meeting being called to order
- 2. Attendance taken
- 3. Votes taken or decisions rendered with a summary of the discussion. Verbatim minutes of any segment are not to be taken unless specifically requested by a member of the Legislature or the Chair of the Legislature. Audio tapes will be made of every authorized meeting and shall be retained for at least a period of one year. Audio tapes primarily serve as a work product for the preparation of the actual minutes and as such, shall not be copied or given out without the express authorization of the Chair of the Legislature, who may invoke Freedom of Information procedures. It being expressly understood, however, that in any discussion, challenge, or other dispute over the accuracy of the minutes, or of the substance of any meeting or hearing or Legislative action, the audio tapes shall constitute the basic record. The priority for the preparation of minutes shall be: Regular meetings, Special meetings, Committee meetings, other hearings and correspondence.
- 4. Copies of the minutes in "draft" form with each page being identified as "draft copy" shall be posted on the Putnam County web-site once prepared and reviewed by the Clerk. Thereafter copies of the minutes shall be posted officially on the Putnam County website as follows:
 - a. Legislative meetings after approval of the minutes by the Putnam County Legislature.
 - b. Committee meetings after approval by the respective Legislative Committee.
 - c. Local laws after approval by the Putnam County Legislature and before County Executive's public hearing.
 - d. To maintain official files and records of the Legislature, its proceedings, appointments, and confirmation of appointments to County office, boards, commissions and other bodies; official communications to and from the Legislature; public record copies of the Executive Budget and the Adopted Budget and such other actions and papers as the Legislature, its Chair, Committees, or applicable law shall require. The Clerk shall condense and summarize all communications from government officials, departments and agencies for inclusion in the Agenda, pursuant to Article IV, Rule 5.
 - e. To publish annually, the proceedings of the Legislature.
 - f. To prepare and publish annually, no later than February 15th, a Legislative Calendar incorporating the dates, times and places of all regular meetings of the Legislature and such else as is deemed appropriate.

g. For compliance with this manual, placing on the desk of a legislator is accomplished by placing in the Legislator's mailbox located in the Legislative Office.

2. Additional duties of the Clerk of the Legislature, as Chief of Staff of the Legislature and its constituent bodies, shall include the following:

- a. To maintain service files and records for the various arms of the Legislature and such clerical and service support as is needed by them, within available means.
- b. To communicate and follow up on Legislator requests for information and service from the office of the County Executive.
- c. To relay regular and special reports, recommendations, proposals and other sources as may be directed by the Chair of the Legislature or requested by the Chair of a standing committee.
- d. To cooperate in any studies or investigations authorized by the Legislature to be conducted by professional or technical organizations or individuals under contract.
- e. To give such other staff as may be required or requested by the Legislature or any of its constituent groups as authorized by the chair and within available means.

III. COMMITTEES OF THE LEGISLATURE:

The right of the Legislature to organize itself is stipulated in the Putnam County Charter. This section of the Legislative Manual sets forth the principal provisions of the committee's structure, notably the eight standing committees. The Legislature may also appoint Special Committees, Boards and Commissions to assist in the efficient conduct of its business.

A. Appointment of Committee Members:

It shall be the duty and responsibility of the Chair of the Legislature to appoint and remove members of the Legislative standing committees. The Chair shall appoint committees within thirty (30) days from the date of the Organizational Meeting, showing the names of the committees and the members thereof and filing with the Clerk of the Legislature. The Clerk, upon receipt of such list, shall place a copy in the legislative mailbox of each legislator or mail a copy to each member of the Legislature.

B. Meetings of the Committees:

Regular meetings of each Standing Committee shall be held at the call of the Committee Chair.
 No meeting of any Standing Committee shall be held during the seven- (7) day period prior to a regularly scheduled meeting of the Legislature.

2.

- a) The Chair of each Committee, upon appointment and after consultation with his or her fellow Committee members, shall provide the Clerk of the Legislature with the day of each month on which that Committee shall meet. To the greatest extent possible, the Chair of each Committee shall schedule a Committee meeting in such a manner as to provide that said meetings take place on the same day of each month (i.e.: the second Tuesday of each month, the last Monday of each month, etc...). The Clerk of the Legislature shall then prepare and circulate to all members of the Legislature, the schedule of that year's regularly scheduled Committee meetings. In the event the regularly scheduled meeting of a Committee falls on a holiday, the Chairman of such Committee shall schedule an alternate day for that month's meeting.
- b) After the calendar has been prepared and circulated, the date of the meeting may be canceled upon the written request by the Committee Chair to the Legislative Chair and subsequent approval by the Legislative Chair. Such request must state the specific justification for the cancellation. Such meeting may not be rescheduled unless each member of such cancelled meeting agrees to such rescheduling. In the event a meeting is cancelled due to inclement weather, the Chair of such cancelled meeting shall have sole discretion as to the rescheduling of such monthly meeting.
- c) The Chairs of each Committee shall schedule their respective Committee meetings in such a manner that no two Committee meetings shall conflict with each other on any day. In the event that a conflict cannot be resolved by the Chairs of Committees which propose to hold more than two meetings on any one day of the month, the Chair of the Legislature shall choose the time of each conflicting meeting.
- d) Nothing herein shall prohibit a Chair of a Committee from scheduling any other Committee meetings during any month, provided that 2/3rds of the member ship of such committee shall concur in the scheduling of such other Committee meeting;
- 3. In the event a scheduled Committee meeting lacks a quorum, the Chairman of said Committee, may temporarily replace any member of that Committee who is not present with another member of the Legislature. This replacement shall be for that specific meeting only and only while the absent member of the Committee is not present, to enable said Committee to conduct its business. Once a meeting has started with a replacement, if at any time during a meeting an absent member of the Committee arrives, the replacement shall step down and all votes taken with the replacement shall be binding.
- 4. Meetings of the Legislature, its standing committees or other Committees or commissions of the Legislature, which have been adjourned due to a lack of a quorum, or recessed meetings of these committees, may be re-scheduled at the discretion of the Chair of each, or on the request of a majority of the committee membership. Members shall be notified of the meetings so adjourned or

- recessed in the same Manner provided for notifying members, as outlined in Article II (B) (3) and Article II (B) (4).
- 5. Special Committees constituted for a particular and generally temporary purpose, shall be organized and meet as specified in the resolution authorizing formation of said committees
- 6. No committee meetings shall be closed to the public, except by majority vote of its membership and only for the reasons specified in applicable law.

C. Standing Committees and their Functions:

1. Standing Committee Systems

The Putnam County Legislature shall operate on the committee system and the manifold operations of the County shall fall within the jurisdiction of the eight standing committees listed in Article II (C) (2) of this Legislative Manual.

2. Functions

- a. The functions of each Standing Committee shall be essentially the same: to expedite the business of the Legislature by considering policy initiatives for and directives from, the Legislature or operations within its jurisdiction; to review operations for compliance with legislative intent and to make recommendations to the Legislature on its own initiative, or at the request of the Legislature. In addition, any individual Legislator may request committee consideration of any matter by filing a request in writing with the Chair of the Legislature who shall forward that request to the appropriate committee Chair. A committee as a group and its individual members, shall be expected to conduct a comprehensive initial review and subsequently periodic reviews, of ongoing and future activities of those governmental units within that committee's jurisdiction. Committee members may be designated to attend meetings of departmental boards and commissions in the capacity of observers.
- b. Matters referred to committees by the Legislature or by individual members through the Chair of the Legislature shall be promptly considered by the committee, unless otherwise provided, a determination shall be made within sixty (60) days of the receipt thereof. If no determination has been made, the committee shall inform the Chair of the Legislature, who shall recommend to the Legislature an extension period that shall not to exceed sixty (60) days.
- c. Once a Standing Committee accepts the assignment of any issue properly before it, the issue shall remain the responsibility solely of that Standing Committee, unless the Chair of the Legislature has given prior approval of and assignment to multi-committee consideration, or unless the Standing Committee, in its deliberations requires the input from another Standing Committee in order to complete its deliberations.
- d. When it has become necessary under multi-committee consideration for both committees to act by resolution and there is no conflict between resolutions, the resolutions shall be presented as

- a combined resolution presented jointly. In the event a conflict develops between the committees which then produce conflicting resolutions, both such resolutions shall be presented to the Full Legislature simultaneously for discussion and debate before a deciding vote is taken.
- e. All substantive and formal actions shall be decided by a majority vote of committee members and the Chair of the committee shall faithfully report such actions even though having voted with the minority on a particular matter.
- f. The Standing and Special Committees shall keep minutes of all meetings including dates and times of the meetings, committee members present and matters discussed as required under Article II (H) ("Powers and Duties of the Clerk of the Legislature").
- g. The original of such report and tape recordings of the meeting shall be filed with the Clerk of the Legislature as soon as possible after each committee meeting.
- h. All resolutions, local laws, or other reports or recommendations submitted to the Legislature for committee consideration and approval by the Full Legislature shall be preceded by a short summary of the intent and effect of the proposal along with the potential fiscal impact for the current year as well as for future years. Any budgetary amendments or budgetary transfers that do not identify the current fiscal impact or future fiscal impacts will be returned to the Finance Department and not reviewed or approved by the Legislature until such information is supplied. The summary shall be read into the record at the time of presentation. Committees may hold public hearings on issues pending before them.

3. Individual Standing Committees

a. Rules, Enactments and Intergovernmental Relations:

The functions of the Standing Committee on Rules, Enactments and Intergovernmental Relations shall include, but not be limited to, the following:

- (1) To recommend the conduct of the legislature through rules, regulations and procedures.
- (2) To review the Legislative Manual annually and recommend its adoption, with any amendments and to render opinions on any matters included in the Legislative Manual, upon request of the Chairman of the Legislature or any members of the Legislature.
- (3) To recommend to the Legislature and its committees, the form, content and frequency of all formal reports prepared for the Legislature by any officer, department head, agency head or County employee or for work performed for, or by the County, through service contracts agreements.
- (4) To designate representatives to sit as observers on any Executive Department Labor Relations Committee that may be created and report thereon to the Rules, Enactments and Intergovernmental Relations Committee, and to the Legislature.
- (5) To review any proceedings or negotiations concerning joint undertakings with other municipal entities including cities, counties, towns, villages or regional government

- associations, upon the request of the Chairman of the Legislature and within the guidelines established by the Legislature.
- (6) To review and make recommendations to the Legislature concerning any legislation on matters of interest to the County for introduction to, or pending before, the State and Federal Legislatures.
- (7) To review and advise the Legislature concerning any suits against the County as well as any litigation of County interest-and non-payment of taxes.
- (8) To review activities of and performance for compliance with legislative intent of the Department of Law, the Board of Elections, the County Clerk and all other agencies of County government not specifically assigned to a particular standing committee.
- (9) To recommend to the Legislature, a Code of Ethics for County Legislators, officers, employees and all persons having or conducting affairs with the County government.

b. Budget and Finance:

The Budget and Finance Committee shall be a standing committee, composed of the entire Legislature. The functions of said committee shall be, but not limited to:

- (1) To review with the Commissioner of Finance each budget item and budget estimates submitted by unit heads and the Tentative Budget as approved by the County Executive.
- (2) To make recommendations to the Legislature on each budget line item based on the review described in paragraph (a) above.
- (3) To review and recommend to the Legislature, necessary action on tax levy matters.
- (4) To exercise sole oversight of the Empire Zone and to forward any legislation with respect to the Empire Zone to the Full Legislature.

c. Audit and Administration:

The functions of the Audit and Administration Committee shall be, but not limited to:

- (1) Exercise legislative oversight of the Department of Finance and of all financial activities and functions as related to program content and performance for compliance with legislative intent, as incorporated in the Budget. This applies especially to funds appropriated in the Budget for specified program purpose and the extent to which the purpose was accomplished within initial and supplemental Budget requests as compared with initially anticipated performance and established standards.
- (2) To review and recommend to the Legislature necessary actions following annual or periodic audits conducted as part of the Legislature's auditing function or following each New York State Department of Audit and Control Report on County Finances and financial procedures and to monitor compliance with recommendations approved by the Legislature.

- (3) To receive and review for completeness and accuracy the Annual report and periodic reports of the Commissioner of Finance.
- (4) To review and make recommendations to the Legislature about the County Executive's actions on appropriation transfers, deficiency appropriations and supplemental appropriations.
- (5) To review and recommend to the Legislature the Legislature's policy on assets, types of investment and terms of investment, use of surplus or general funds and authorization and issuance of County debt obligations.
- (6) To review for adequacy the County Executive's recommended insurance coverage and policies
- (7) To review and recommend to the Legislature necessary action on assessment, equalization and taxation.
- (8) To review and recommend to the Legislature necessary action on purchasing procedures, bids, bonds and capital project financing.
- (9) To exercise legislative oversight for compliance with legislative intent of all County government departments, agencies and units as well as citizen advisory boards and commissions that utilize information technology in the transactions carrying out their charge and purpose, for the benefit, well-being and convenience of the people of Putnam County.

d. Health, Social and Educational Services/Environmental:

The functions of the Committee on Health, Social and Educational Services/Environmental, shall include but not be limited to the following:

- (1) To exercise legislative oversight for compliance with legislative intent of all County government departments, agencies and units, as well as of advisory citizen boards providing health, social or educational services to the County or its residents. Included in these categories shall be the Department of Health, the Board of Health, the Department of Mental Health, the Mental Health Board, the Department of Social Services, the Office of the Aging, the County Historian, the Veterans Service Agency, the County Cooperative Extension Service, the Community Services Board and the Coordinating Council for People with Disabilities.
- (2) To initiate and recommend legislative policy and upon Legislative request or its own initiative and present its recommendations for Legislative action on the following:
 - 1. All public welfare programs including those of semi-independent agencies and special services contributing to the public welfare.
 - 2. All programs of the Office for the Aging.
 - 3. All public and environmental health facilities and programs

- 4. All mental health programs and services that may be undertaken by the County government or fall within its jurisdiction.
- (3) To exercise legislative oversight over all executed contracts between the departments, agencies, etc., listed in sub-clause (a) above and any other person, institution or unit of government.
- (4) To recommend policy toward and maintain contact with voluntary or civic associations providing health or welfare services to residents of the County.

e. Physical Services:

The functions of the Committee of Physical Services shall include but not be limited to the following:

- (1) To exercise legislative oversight for compliance with legislative intent of all County government departments, agencies and units as well as citizen advisory boards and commissions that render physical services for the well-being and convenience of the County of its residents. Included in these categories shall be the Department of Highways and Facilities, the Division of Planning and Development, the Planning Board and the Recreation Commission, the Lake Management Advisory Committee and the Soil & Water Conservation District, as well as physical work performed for or by the County government in association with other local jurisdictions and contractors paid from County funds.
- (2) To represent the Legislature in all maters or concern to the above County governmental units and make reports with recommendations to the Legislation thereon.
- (3) To recommend to the Legislature any legislative action involving the above mentioned departments and agencies.

f. Protective Services:

The functions of the Committee on Protective Services shall include but not be limited to the following:

- (1) To exercise legislative oversight to assure compliance with legislative intent of all County government departments, agencies and units, as well as citizen advisory boards and commissions, that render protective services for the well-being of County residents. Included in these categories shall be the Office of the District Attorney, the Office of Probation, the Sheriff's Department, the Putnam County Jail, the Coroners, the Putnam County Legal Aid Society, the Bureau of Emergency Service and the Traffic Safety Board.
- (2) To exercise legislative oversight over all executed contracts between the above units, boards and commissions and any person, institution or unit of government.
- (3) To initiate and recommend legislative policy for all protective and custodial services performed by the County government.

(4) To give advice and initiate the action required of the Legislature concerning the relationship of the County government to agencies that administer criminal justice.

g. Personnel

The functions of the Committee on Personnel shall include but not be limited to the following:

- (1) To exercise legislative oversight for compliance with legislative intent on all matters involving personnel throughout the County government.
- (2) To make recommendations to the Legislature on personnel matters when deemed necessary.

h. Economic Development and Energy

The functions of the Committee of Economic Development and Energy shall include but not be limited to the following:

- (1) To recommend to the Legislature ways to promote economic development and increase opportunities for business retention and expansion in Putnam County.
- (2) To review activities and assist in the efforts of the Putnam County Visitors Bureau, established to promote travel and tourism in Putnam County.
- (3) To review agreements between Putnam County and independent Bureaus, agencies and companies providing services to increase opportunities for economic development recommending to the Full Legislature appropriate agreements between such entities.
- (4) To represent the Legislature, on its request, in all regional and local programs for planning and economic development.
- (5) To provide oversight of green energy initiatives in its mission to bring more green energy infrastructure to Putnam County.

D. Committee Vacancies:

In the event of a vacancy on any Legislative Committee, the Chair of the Legislature shall fill the vacancy by appointment in the same manner that the original member was appointed.

E. Services Provided to the Legislative Committees:

In order to guide the work of each committee efficiently and effectively, each committee chair may seek the assistance of the Clerk of the Legislature. This service shall include secretarial and recording facilities, the taking of minutes of meetings, including actions voted on, correspondence, reports and research assistance.

Requests from any committee Chair to the Executive Branch shall be routed through the Clerk, who shall prepare a written request and monitor compliance with the requests. This procedure shall also be

followed by committee seeking the counsel of or testimony from any official, department head or employee of the Executive Branch, or any special services, reports or data from any department or unit of the Executive Branch.

Assistance from or counsel of elected officials such as the County Clerk, or the District Attorney, or Sheriff shall be relayed directly to the individual official by the Clerk.

Counsel to the Legislature may be contacted directly by the Clerk to arrange for such legal and other appropriate services as may be required by any committee. This includes drafting of resolutions to be presented to the Legislature. Any special services from consultants, technicians or other specialists not in the regular employ of the County that require the expenditure of County funds must be authorized in advance by the Legislature. See Article V.

F. Special Committees, Citizen Advisory Committees, Commissions Or Boards and their functions:

1. Special Committees of the Legislature may be created by the Legislature to help it transact its business. Each Special Committee shall be concerned with only one specific and definite purpose and shall be established for a limited duration, either to serve until a specific date or to serve until it completes its specific assignment. Special Committees shall be limited solely to members of the Legislature. The Chair of the Legislature shall appoint members of such Special Committees, subject to the approval of the Legislature. Special Committees shall establish their own regular meeting dates, and shall be governed by the Rules of Order and Procedure as outlined in Article IV.

2. Citizens' Advisory Committees, Commissions

The Legislature may appoint Citizens' Advisory Committees and Commissions. At the time of the appointment of each of these bodies, the Legislature may appoint a member as liaison or ex-officio. These bodies may be created by the Chair of the Legislature with the approval of the Legislature, or upon its own initiative by a majority of the entire Legislature, The Committees and Commissions shall serve the Legislature.

The Citizens' advisory body shall be composed of residents of Putnam County and where possible, shall contain a representative from each Town in the County. The appointment of the Chair and officers and the numerical and geographic make-up of the body shall be approved by the Legislature. Members may set their own meeting agenda.

A Citizens' Advisory body shall be established for a limited time until it has completed its task or until abolished by the Legislature.

IV. RULES OF ORDER AND PROCEDURE:

Roberts' Rules of Order, Newly Revised, shall be the specific rules of order and procedure for the conduct of the meetings of the Putnam County Legislature and of its committees, citizen advisory committees or commissions, insofar as they are applicable and not inconsistent with the Rules of Proceedings contained in this manual.

The Standing Committee on Rules and Enactments shall be responsible for the correct procedure within the rules. A question on the proper application of any rule, or if no rule can be found to clearly apply in a given instance shall be referred to the Rules Committee for interpretation or remedy.

Each and every meeting of the Putnam County Legislature and its committees, boards and commissions shall be open to all members of the public, unless otherwise specified by law.

Rule 1- Roll Call:

Each and every meeting shall be called to order at the time appointed by the Chair and the Clerk shall call the roll and enter the names of those committee members present or absent in the minutes. If a quorum is not present for a Committee meeting, the Chairman of said Committee may temporarily replace any member of that Committee who is not present with another member of the Legislature (See Section III (B) (3).) If a quorum is not present for a Full or Special Meeting the member(s) attending must call for an Adjourned Meeting, requesting the Clerk to issue an appropriate notice, setting time and date for a new meeting.

Names of any members of a Committee of the Legislature arriving late or departing early for a committee meeting shall be inserted in the minutes of the meeting by the Clerk, noting the time of arrival or departure. Also the names of any members of the Legislature arriving late or departing early for a meeting of the Legislature shall be inserted in the minutes of the meeting by the Clerk, noting the time of arrival or departure.

Rule 2 - Quorum:

A majority of the entire Legislature or of any Standing or Special Committee or Advisory Commission shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of its business except that a lesser number may be present to vote to adjourn a meeting.

Rule 3 - Manner of Accepting Minutes:

The minutes of the preceding meeting or any portion thereof, of the Legislature shall be read at the request of any Legislator who wishes to enter objections, alterations or additions. Otherwise, the minutes of the preceding meeting shall be automatically approved without formal actions.

Rule 4 - Exercise of Power of the Legislature:

A Power of the Legislature, except as otherwise provided, shall be exercised through a Local Law Act, Ordinance or Resolution duly adopted by the Legislature. In each calendar year, each Local Law, Ordinance or Resolution shall be numbered consecutively and dated and be given a title concisely stating the subject matter thereof.

Rule 5 (A) - Order of Business:

The Order of Business at each meeting of the Legislature shall be as follows:

- 1. Pledge of Allegiance
- 2. Legislative Prayer
- 3. Roll Call of the Legislators
- 4. Acceptance of the Minutes
- 5. A statement that communications from government officials, Departments and agencies has been summarized and attached to the Agenda. The subject text is available in the Office of the Clerk of the Legislature. There shall be no public discussion of the aforementioned unless brought up under new business.
- Consideration of reports of Citizens' Advisory Committees or Commissions and Boards and Petitions from members of the public:
 - There shall be no public discussion of the aforementioned unless brought up by new business.
- 7. Unfinished Business:
- 8. Reports of the Standing and Special Committee will be delivered with the presentation of prefiled Resolutions and Local Laws, etc., for discussion and vote.
- 9. Presentation of a pre-filed request from a Legislator shall be referred by the Chair to the appropriate committee, unless a majority of the Legislators present and voting, authorize same to be discussed and voted upon.
- 10. Presentation of new business: any item that was not on the agenda by any Legislator for discussion is subject to a unanimous vote of the members present and voting to suspend the rules pursuant to Rule 24
- 11. Recognition of Public on agenda items.
- 12. Recognition of Legislators.
- 13. Adjournment of Meeting:

Rule 5 (B) - Remove from Agenda:

Any item may be removed from the agenda by a majority vote of the members present and voting without debate on the issue.

Rule 6 - Chair to Preside:

The Chair of the Legislature shall preside at all regular and special meetings of the Legislature. The Chair shall preserve order and decorum, confine discussion to the matter at issue and decide questions of order, subject to appeal by the Legislature. The Deputy Chair shall preside in the event of the Chair's absence for not more than one consecutively held meeting. In the event the Chair shall miss a second consecutive meeting, the Legislature shall appoint a temporary chair for that meeting.

Rule 7 - Appeal of a Decision of the Chair:

On any duly seconded motion appealing a decision of the Chair on a matter of order, the Chair may first state the reason for its decision, after which any Legislator may speak on the subject and will not be recognized again until all Legislators have had the opportunity to speak on that subject before the Chair puts the question: "Shall the Chair's ruling be sustained?" The question shall then be decided without debate by roll call vote of a majority of the Legislators present, excluding the Chair, who shall not vote on such an appeal.

Rule 8 - When the Chair May Speak:

The Chair of the Legislature may speak on any matter pending before the Legislature in his capacity as a Legislator and may do so without designating another Legislator to serve as temporary Presiding Chair, unless he so desires.

Rule 9 - When the Chair May Vote:

The Chair of the Legislature shall be entitled to one vote, equal and similar to all other Legislators on all matters except the aforementioned appeal proceeding. (See Rule 7).

Rule 10 - Majority Vote Necessary:

A majority of the entire Legislature shall be required to carry any question, proposition, resolution, local law or motion, except when otherwise provided in these rules or by statute or the Putnam County Charter calling for a two-thirds majority or some other vote. A tie vote on any matter before the Legislature shall be deemed a defeat and the question shall be lost.

Rule 11. Addressing the Chair

Every member wishing to speak to a question or make a motion shall gain attention by raising his hand and the Chair shall recognize the member entitled to the floor by stating his/her name. Members so recognized for the purpose of addressing the Legislature shall address the Chair and confine their comments to the question under consideration.

Rule 12 - Debate Limitation:

No member shall be allowed to speak more than once on any subject until every other Member choosing to be heard on the subject, shall have spoken. Debate may be limited or extended by a two-thirds vote of the Members present and on a motion to limit or extend a debate; an immediate vote shall be taken without further discussion.

Rule 13 - Recognition of Persons Not Members of the Legislature:

Persons who are not members of the Legislature may by consent, be permitted to speak during debate. Such consent shall be given by the Chair, subject to a two-thirds override by members of the Legislature who are present.

Rule 14 - Referrals to Committees:

- A. All petitions, reports, motions, resolutions and communications requiring legislative committee review shall be referred by the Legislative Chair, without motion, to the Legislative Committee having charge of the subject at hand. This does not preclude any committee chairperson from placing items on a committee agenda without the approval of the Legislative Chair.
- B. Once a resolution or local law has been placed on a legislative committee agenda for consideration, said resolution or local law cannot be forwarded to the Full Legislature unless the legislative committee has forwarded the recommendation to the Legislature by resolution or local law. Once 60 days have passed from the date the resolution or local law was first placed on a legislative committee agenda for review and after any additional extension period has expired, an individual legislator may bring the resolution or local law to the Full Legislature, providing the resolution or local law has been reviewed as to form by the County Attorney or Legislative Counsel. The resolution or local law must also be submitted five days prior to the meeting date and the resolution or local law is listed as an agenda item for that meeting.
- C. Ordinarily the Legislature shall consider only those matters that have been studied previously by the appropriate Standing Committee. However, the Legislature may consider any matter without Committee study, and approval, with a majority vote of the Legislature, providing the issue comes to the Full Legislature in resolution form.

Rule 15 - Enactment of Legislation:

A. (1) Introduction of a question: All petitions, reports, motions and resolutions shall be introduced by a standing committee, except those made from the floor pursuant to the procedure of the Legislature. Requests or proposals from the Executive branch which might result in a resolution shall be made through the Chair of the Legislature.

- (2) In order to be placed on the Agenda of the next scheduled meeting, all such petitions, reports, motions, proclamations, resolutions and any other requests, except local laws, shall be filed with the Clerk of Legislature at least seven (7) days before the meeting date.
- (3) Local laws shall be filed with the Clerk of the Legislature to enable compliance with Municipal Home Rule Section 20 (4) for service upon Legislators.
- (4) All motions, except those reported from a standing committee, whether pre-filed or made from the floor shall require a second before debate and vote or a second before vote, on matters that are debatable. The subject matter of a Committee resolution shall be limited to matters within the assigned province of the Committee. If the matter under question or some aspect of it falls within the province of more than one committee, any of these committees may offer the resolution. All Resolutions or Local Laws submitted to the Legislature shall have a statement to indicate what the fiscal impact will be for the current fiscal year and the ensuing year.
- B. When Debate is in Order: After a motion has been made and seconded, where needed, if requested by any legislator, it shall be restated by the Chair or read by the Clerk before being put before the Legislature for debate.
- C. Moving the Question: The Legislature can order the closing of a debate on a motion stating: "I call the question on (specify the motion)." An immediate vote shall be taken without debate or amendment, with a two-thirds majority required to close debate in this manner, providing any member who has not exhausted his/her right to debate desires the floor.
- D. Voting Procedure: At the close of debate, the motion shall, if requested by any legislator, be restated by the Chair, or read by the Clerk, before it is voted upon. Votes of the Legislature may be made by a voice vote or show of hands. On the request of any member or the Chair, there shall be a roll call vote. The Clerk of the Legislature shall call the roll in alphabetical order except for the Chairman who shall vote last and record in the minutes how each legislator voted. Every Legislator present when the question is stated from the Chair, shall vote on the questions, unless he abstains from voting and states his reason for abstaining. A Legislator's vote will be recorded in the affirmative unless he expresses his view in the negative or abstains as aforesaid. A member shall have the right to change his vote in accordance with Rule 20.

Rule 16 - Effective Date of Resolutions:

All resolutions shall become effective upon their adoption except when otherwise expressly provided by law or in such resolution.

Rule 17 - When Motions are Receivable:

When a question is under debate, no motion shall be entertained unless it provides for any of the following:

- a. to adjourn
- b. to lay on the table
- c. to call the previous question/moving the question
- d. to refer to committee
- e. to amend
- f. to extend or limit debate

Any of these motions shall have preference in the order in which they are here stated. The first three motions (a., b., and c.) are neither amendable nor debatable.

Rule 18 - Motion to Divide the Question:

If any question contains more than one distinct proposition, it shall be divided by the Chair at the request of any one member.

Rule 19 - Motion to Lay on the Table:

A motion to Lay/Defer on the Table is acceptable after debate has begun and at any time during debate before the vote on said motion has begun. A motion to Lay/Defer on the Table shall preclude amendments and debate on the main question, only if all Legislators had the opportunity to speak once on the main question. There shall be no debate on such a motion and the matter shall be put to an immediate vote. A majority vote of those present shall be necessary to Lay/Defer on the Table. A motion to Lay/Defer on the Table may be for an indefinite period or a specified period of time. In addition, at the discretion of the Chair a motion to Lay/Defer on the Table may be referred to the appropriate Committee subject to an override by the majority of the Legislature.

Rule 20 - Motion to Reconsider:

A motion to reconsider any resolution or motion shall be entertained by the Chair when it has been moved by a Legislator and when such motion to reconsider is to be voted upon at the same meeting, wherein said motion was passed, or at the continuation of a recessed meeting, where said motion was passed. Such a motion to reconsider shall require the affirmative vote of a majority of the Legislature.

Rule 21 - Motion to Take from the Table:

All reports, resolutions and other matters laid on the table may be called therefrom under "Unfinished Business" in the regular order of business. However, no report, resolution or other matter laid indefinitely on the table shall be called from the table except by consent of a majority of those present.

Rule 22 - Withdrawal of a Motion:

After a motion is stated by the Chair, it shall be in possession of the legislature, but it may be withdrawn by the introducer, with the consent of any seconder, at any time before a decision or amendment is made, providing there is no objection. Withdrawal shall then be achieved by a consenting vote of a majority of the Legislators present.

Rule 23 - Amendment of the Rules:

The Legislature may amend its rules by a majority vote of all of its members at any time after giving members five (5) days' notice, accompanied by a written copy of the proposed amendment unless otherwise provided by law.

Rule 24 - Change of the Rules:

- A. The Board may, by unanimous vote of those present and voting, waive or suspend any rule of the Board, so long as it does not conflict with any Charter provisions. A motion to take a matter out of order and advance it or delay it on the Agenda shall need only a majority vote.
- B. The rules of the Legislature for the preceding year shall remain in effect at the first meeting of each year and until the formal adoption of the rules for the current year.

Rule 25 - Communications From County Executive:

Any communication, recommendation or other matter received from the County Executive with a message requesting immediate (emergency) consideration must be filed with the Clerk of the Legislature.

Rule 26 - Regular Meetings of the Legislature:

Regular Meetings of the Putnam County Legislature shall be held monthly at 7:00 PM, on the first Tuesday, except when a holiday falls on the regularly specified date, the meeting shall be held the next business day unless the Legislature decides otherwise. The Clerk of the Putnam County Legislature shall place in each Legislator's Legislative mailbox a written notice stating the date, time and place of each meeting at least five (5) days prior to the date of the meeting, or if requested by an individual Legislator, said written notice shall be mailed, faxed or e-mailed to said Legislator. Said notice shall state the subject matter of all resolutions, ordinances and local laws to be voted on at such meeting. A member may waive the service of notice in a signed statement. NOTE: Local laws also need to comply with Section 20(4) of the Municipal Home Rule Law.

Rule 27 - Special Meetings and Service of Notice:

The Special Meetings shall be held at the call of the Clerk of the Legislature upon direction of the Chair and four other Legislators, or upon written request signed by a majority of the entire Legislature. Notice

in writing stating date, time, place and purpose of the Special Meeting, shall be placed in the legislative mailbox of each legislator. Supplemental notification shall be by U.S. Mail, e-mail, facsimile or other reasonable means of communication or as requested by any Legislator in writing to the Clerk of the Legislature to each member of the Legislature by the Clerk of the Legislature. Additionally a notice of Special Meeting may be served upon a member of the Legislature pursuant to Article 3 of the CPLR. Such personal notice shall be made at least forty-eight (48) hours in advance. Only business specified in the notice thereof may be transacted at a special meeting. A member may waive the service of notice in a signed statement.

Rule 28 – Additional Materials: (formerly Rule 29)

- a) No additional materials or items to be added to an agenda shall be accepted at any Legislative Committee Meeting or a Meeting of the Full Legislature without a letter of necessity from the sponsoring Putnam County Elected Official with full explanation as to the nature of the urgency and the potential impact on failure to act immediately.
- b) The acceptance of such additional materials or agenda items shall be subject to a two-thirds super majority vote of the members present at either a Legislative Committee Meeting or a Meeting of the Legislature.

Rule 29 - Adjournment: (formerly Rule 28)

A motion to adjourn a meeting shall always be in order, except while a vote is being taken and such motion shall be decided without debate. At the hour of Eleven PM, all discussion will be ceased and if possible, a vote will be taken on the question at hand. If the matter discussed demands further consideration, unless the meeting is extended under Rule 24, it shall be automatically tabled and be considered at the next regular meeting under "Unfinished Business," Rule 5 (a) (6), on the Agenda.

Rule 30 - Protection of Confidential Material

No member of the Legislature shall disclose Confidential Material except as provided for in Chapter 55 (Ethics, Code of, and Financial Disclosure) of the Putnam County Code. The term "Confidential Material" as used in this Rule shall have the same meaning as in Chapter 55, but shall also include any information obtained or discussed in any executive session meeting of the Legislature or of any of its Committees, but shall not include information required to be made public pursuant to New York State Public Officers Law Article 7 (Open Meetings Law). Violation of this Rule shall be grounds for Censure of a Legislator pursuant to Section II. G. of this Legislative Manual.

Rule 31 – Live Streaming Legislative Sessions and Public Hearings

A. Live Streaming of Legislative Sessions1. Live Streaming Availability:

All regular and special legislative sessions will, to the greatest extent possible, be broadcast live, making use of platforms such as the County website or YouTube.

2. Public Access and Recording:

Sessions will, to the greatest extent possible, be fully accessible online, with recordings available for on-demand viewing to ensure continued public access to legislative activities and deliberations.

- B. Committee Sessions and Public Hearings
 - Live Streaming of Committee Sessions and Public Hearings:
 Committee sessions and public hearings will also be, to the greatest extent possible, live streamed.
- C. Review and Feedback
 - 1. Public Input:

The Legislature encourages ongoing feedback from the public on the live streaming process and will periodically review how the program can be improved for maximum effectiveness and accessibility.

Rule 32 - Public Comment during Regular or Special Full Legislative Meetings and Committee Meetings Prior to Taking a Vote

- A. All committee meetings shall include a designated period for public comment prior to any votes being taken on agenda items. This public comment period shall be structured in a manner that is consistent, fair, and efficient, with a time limit for individual comments to ensure that all individuals wishing to speak are given an opportunity to do so.
- B. If a draft resolution or local law has not gone through the committee process but is being requested to be considered at a regular or special full legislative meeting as either a pre-filed request pursuant to Rule 5(A)(9) or as new business pursuant to Rule 5(A)(10), and following a procedural vote as to whether such resolution should be placed before the County Legislature for consideration, there shall be a designated period for public comment on the substance of such resolution prior to any votes being taken on such resolution. This public comment period shall be structured in a manner that is consistent, fair, and efficient, with a time limit for individual comments to ensure that all individuals wishing to speak are given an opportunity to do so.
- C. To the extent possible, the Chair of each full legislative meeting or committee meeting shall notify the public in advance of the meeting agenda and the designated time for public comment, providing reasonable access for the public to attend and participate in the meeting; and
- D. Any member of the public who wishes to speak during the recognition of the public on agenda items shall be given a fair opportunity to present their views, consistent with the Rules of Order and Procedure of the County Legislature.

Rule 33 - Confirmation of Appointments of the County Executive

Upon the filing by the County Executive with the Clerk of the County Legislature of a written appointment of the head of a County department or administrative unit pursuant to Charter Section 3.03, and in order for the County Legislature to perform its confirmation responsibilities pursuant to Charter Section 2.08, the Chair of the Legislature shall refer such appointment to one of the Standing Committees of the County Legislature to review said appointment and to conduct a Committee meeting in connection with such appointment.

- A. Following such referral, and prior to the date of said Standing Committee meeting, the appointee shall provide the following to such Standing Committee in connection with such Committee review:
 - a written professional resume;
 - three (3) written references from persons engaged in the professional area of expertise to which the appointee is being considered to be maintained under confidential cover, not to be released to the public, pursuant to Public Officers Law §89(2)(b)(i);

- a signed document stating whether such appointee has any interest* in any contract* with the County. (*as such terms are defined in Article 18 of the New York State General Municipal Law).
- B. The Standing Committee to which such appointment has been referred shall conduct a committee meeting to interview said appointee.
- C. At the conclusion of said Standing Committee meeting, said Standing Committee shall adopt a resolution to be prefiled at a subsequent meeting of the County Legislature stating one of the following three (3) results: 1-approve appointment, 2-disapprove appointment or 3-no recommendation.

V. RELATIONSHIP BETWEEN THE LEGISLATURE AND EXECUTIVE BRANCH:

The Legislature and Executive Branches of the Putnam County Government shall be separate and coequal, as established by the Putnam County Charter. The Legislature shall be responsible for determining policy through the enactment of legislation and for appropriating funds and levying taxes. The Executive Branch shall be responsible for the efficient administration of the County's government. A smooth process of communication between the Legislature and the Executive Branch shall be essential to the efficient conduct of County business and government. A process for communication is outlined in the following paragraphs:

- A. Requests by any Legislator on behalf of the Legislature for any type of information or cooperation from the Executive Branch, shall be made through the Clerk of the Legislature to the County Executive, who in turn shall channel each request to the appropriate unit under his jurisdiction or deal with it himself. Nothing shall prevent any individual Legislator in the performance of his/her duties from contacting or receiving any information from any unit of County government.
- B. Requests for information from elected County officials shall be made through the Clerk of the Legislature's Office, to the official concerned (District Attorney, County Clerk, Sheriff, Coroners), with an informational copy being sent to the County Executive.
- C. Any matters concerning legislation of interest to members of the Executive Branch shall be channeled through the County Executive's office to the Clerk of the Legislature and the Chair of the appropriate Legislative Committee. After communications have passed through the appropriate channels, direct meetings between the members of the Executive Branch and the Committees of the Legislature shall be in order.
- D. Any request by the Executive Branch for a resolution or local law shall be presented to the Legislature in a proposed final form approved by the Department of Law. This process is designed to facilitate normal processes of communication and cooperation between the Legislature and the Executive Branch of the Putnam County Government. In emergencies, more direct communication may be considered necessary.

VI. ANNUAL SWEARING-IN CEREMONY

- A. The Putnam County annual Swearing-In Ceremony shall be held on the County's last calendar day of the year at 5:00 P.M. in the Historic Courthouse;
- B. The Swearing-In Ceremony shall be limited to the swearing in of elected County, State and Federal officials only;
- C. Guests to be introduced at the ceremony shall be limited to elected County, State and Federal officials who are not participating in the ceremony and any special guest deemed appropriate by the Clerk of the Legislature;
- D. Those participating in the ceremony shall remember that the event is to acknowledge and honor those officials who have been elected or re-elected in the past November general election and shall channel their remarks to accomplish this goal.

RESOLUTION OF THE COUNTY OF PUTNAM, NEW YORK ADOPTED AUGUST 5, 2025, AUTHORIZING THE REDEMPTION OF CERTAIN OUTSTANDING SERIAL BONDS OF SAID COUNTY, AND RESOLVING OTHER MATTERS RELATIVE THERETO.

WHEREAS, the County of Putnam, New York (the "County") has heretofore duly issued \$11,060,000 aggregate principal amount of Public Improvement Refunding Serial Bonds - 2015, such bonds dated April 15, 2015 and maturing in annual installments in each of the years 2015 to 2031, both inclusive (the "Outstanding Bonds"), as more fully described therein; and

WHEREAS, the Outstanding Bonds were authorized pursuant to a refunding bond resolution dated February 4, 2015 and were issued to refund all or a portion of the principal balance of the \$16,208,000 Public Improvement (Serial) Bonds, 2007 (the "2007 Refunding Bonds"), as more fully described therein; and

WHEREAS, the 2007 Refunding Bonds were authorized pursuant to various bond resolutions dated August, 6, 2005, July 5, 2006, December 2, 2003 and December 5, 2006 (collectively, the "Bond Resolutions") to finance parking lot paving, construction of a new central County Courthouse, highway infrastructure and road construction and acquisition of MacGregor Golf Course; and

WHEREAS, the Outstanding Bonds were authorized, issued, sold and delivered subject to the right of the County to redeem the Outstanding Bonds maturing on or after January 15, 2027, as a whole or in part in principal amounts of \$5,000 or integral multiples thereof, on January 15, 2026, or on any date thereafter at par, plus accrued interest to the date of redemption; and

WHEREAS, the County Legislature of the County hereby finds and determines that it is in the best interest of the County to use lawfully available funds of the County to redeem prior to maturity the Outstanding Bonds on the date and in the manner hereinafter provided and in accordance with the requirements prescribed therefor and a notice of redemption of such Outstanding Bonds shall be given as provided in the Bond Resolutions; and

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE COUNTY LEGISLATURE OF THE COUNTY OF PUTNAM, NEW YORK, AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. The County Legislature of the County hereby authorizes the redemption of the Outstanding Bonds on January 15, 2026 or such other date as may be determined by the Commissioner of Finance pursuant to Section 2 of this Resolution.

Section 2. Attached to this Resolution as Exhibit "A" and made a part hereof for all purposes, is a copy of the draft Notice of Redemption for the Outstanding Bonds in substantially final form with such changes and additions approved by the Commissioner of Finance, the chief fiscal officer of the County. The Commissioner of Finance, the County's municipal advisor, the County's bond counsel are hereby authorized to take all actions necessary to call for the redemption of such Outstanding Bonds, including finalizing the Notice of Redemption and sending all notices of such redemption required by the documents authorizing the issuance of the Outstanding Bonds. The Commissioner of Finance is further authorized to determine the timing of the redemption of the Outstanding Bonds and the delivery of the notice once all requirements of this Resolution for such redemption have been satisfied; provided that such notice in all events is to be

given by the time and in the manner required in the Bond Resolutions and other documents authorizing the issuance of the Outstanding Bonds.

Section 3. The Commissioner of Finance is hereby authorized to transfer available funds of the County, as necessary, to redeem the Outstanding Bonds prior to maturity. The County is hereby authorized and directed to cause notice of such call for redemption to be given in the name of the County in the manner and within the time provided in the Outstanding Bonds and in Section 53 of the Local Finance Law. Notice of such call for redemption shall be given by mailing such notice to the registered holder not more than sixty (60) days nor less than thirty (30) days prior to such date. Notice of redemption having been given as aforesaid, the Outstanding Bonds so called for redemption shall, on the date for redemption set forth in such call for redemption, become due and payable, together with interest to such redemption date, and interest shall case to be paid thereon after such redemption date.

Section 4. The Commissioner of Finance and all other officers, employees and agents of the County, and each of them, shall be and they are hereby expressly authorized, empowered and directed from time to time and at any time to do and perform all such acts and things, including giving any notices as may be required by the County's continuing disclosure obligations, if any, with respect to the Outstanding Bonds and all other instruments, whether or not herein mentioned, as may be necessary or desirable in order to carry out the terms and provisions of this Resolution or the Bond Resolutions authorizing the Outstanding Bonds.

<u>Section 5</u>. If any provision of this Resolution or the application thereof to any circumstance shall be held to be invalid, the remainder of this Resolution and the application thereof to other circumstances shall nevertheless be valid, and this governing body hereby declares that this Resolution would have been enacted without such invalid provision.

<u>Section 6</u>. This Resolution shall take effect immediately upon its approval of the County Executive and the Clerk of the County Legislature.

Re: Request to Present to Audit Committee Monday July 28rd, 2025

Commissioner Tully and I are respectfully requesting the opportunity to revisit our discussion that took place back on Monday June 23rd regarding the current and potential fiscal arrangements for the Putnam County Golf Course and the prospects said arrangements may offer.

To recap, back in December 2003, The County used proceeds of tax exempt bonds to finance the acquisition of the Golf Course. The IRS Safe Harbor Rules associated with the bond limited the manner in which the County could employ private businesses at the golf course. Resultingly, contractual compensation for both operations and food and beverage services is and has been restrictive.

The County is currently in a position to "call" the bonds on January 15, 2026. This is an excellent opportunity for the County to evaluate the way business could be conducted in the future at the Golf Course, without restriction, if the bonds were to be called.

As I mentioned to the Committee, there's specific timelines that need to be met in order to properly execute. The first step is to get authorization via a Resolution (see attached) from the County Legislature authorizing the Commissioner of Finance to transfer available funds to redeem the Outstanding Bonds (\$4,725,000) prior to maturity (January 15, 2026). In addition, this same resolution also gives the authority to the Commissioner of Finance to work with the County's Bond Council (Barclay & Damon). In accordance with Section 53 of the Local Finance Law, notice of such call for redemption shall be given by mailing to the registered holder(s) not more than sixty (60) days (November 15, 2025) nor less than thirty (30) days (December 15, 2025) prior to such date (January 15, 2026).

In conclusion, we're recommending that such resolution be considered for committee approval and moved forward to the August Full Meeting. As I've mentioned in the previous audit committee meeting, please keep in mind the timeline as we approach the year end which includes our 2026 Budget Proceedings and the holiday season.

WHEREAS, the County of Putnam, New York (the "County") has heretofore duly issued \$11,060,000 aggregate principal amount of Public Improvement Refunding Serial Bonds - 2015, such bonds dated April 15, 2015 and maturing in annual installments in each of the years 2015 to 2031, both inclusive (the "Outstanding Bonds"), as more fully described therein; and

BONDS OF SAID COUNTY, AND RESOLVING OTHER

MATTERS RELATIVE THERETO.

WHEREAS, the Outstanding Bonds were authorized pursuant to a refunding bond resolution dated February 4, 2015 and were issued to refund all or a portion of the principal balance

of the \$16,208,000 Public Improvement (Serial) Bonds, 2007 (the "2007 Refunding Bonds"), as more fully described therein; and

WHEREAS, the 2007 Refunding Bonds were authorized pursuant to various bond resolutions dated August, 6, 2005, July 5, 2006, December 2, 2003 and December 5, 2006 (collectively, the "Bond Resolutions") to finance parking lot paving, construction of a new central County Courthouse, highway infrastructure and road construction and acquisition of MacGregor Golf Course; and

WHEREAS, the Outstanding Bonds were authorized, issued, sold and delivered subject to the right of the County to redeem the Outstanding Bonds maturing on or after January 15, 2027, as a whole or in part in principal amounts of \$5,000 or integral multiples thereof, on January 15, 2026, or on any date thereafter at par, plus accrued interest to the date of redemption; and

WHEREAS, the County Legislature of the County hereby finds and determines that it is in the best interest of the County to use lawfully available funds of the County to redeem prior to maturity the Outstanding Bonds on the date and in the manner hereinafter provided and in accordance with the requirements prescribed therefor and a notice of redemption of such Outstanding Bonds shall be given as provided in the Bond Resolutions; and

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE COUNTY LEGISLATURE OF THE COUNTY OF PUTNAM, NEW YORK, AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. The County Legislature of the County hereby authorizes the redemption of the Outstanding Bonds on January 15, 2026 or such other date as may be determined by the Commissioner of Finance pursuant to Section 2 of this Resolution.

Section 2. Attached to this Resolution as Exhibit "A" and made a part hereof for all purposes, is a copy of the draft Notice of Redemption for the Outstanding Bonds in substantially

final form with such changes and additions approved by the Commissioner of Finance, the chief fiscal officer of the County. The Commissioner of Finance, the County's municipal advisor, the County's bond counsel are hereby authorized to take all actions necessary to call for the redemption of such Outstanding Bonds, including finalizing the Notice of Redemption and sending all notices of such redemption required by the documents authorizing the issuance of the Outstanding Bonds. The Commissioner of Finance is further authorized to determine the timing of the redemption of the Outstanding Bonds and the delivery of the notice once all requirements of this Resolution for such redemption have been satisfied; provided that such notice in all events is to be given by the time and in the manner required in the Bond Resolutions and other documents authorizing the issuance of the Outstanding Bonds.

Section 3. The Commissioner of Finance is hereby authorized to transfer available funds of the County, as necessary, to redeem the Outstanding Bonds prior to maturity. The County is hereby authorized and directed to cause notice of such call for redemption to be given in the name of the County in the manner and within the time provided in the Outstanding Bonds and in Section 53 of the Local Finance Law. Notice of such call for redemption shall be given by mailing such notice to the registered holder not more than sixty (60) days nor less than thirty (30) days prior to such date. Notice of redemption having been given as aforesaid, the Outstanding Bonds so called for redemption shall, on the date for redemption set forth in such call for redemption, become due and payable, together with interest to such redemption date, and interest shall case to be paid thereon after such redemption date.

Section 4. The Commissioner of Finance and all other officers, employees and agents of the County, and each of them, shall be and they are hereby expressly authorized, empowered and directed from time to time and at any time to do and perform all such acts and things, including

giving any notices as may be required by the County's continuing disclosure obligations, if any, with respect to the Outstanding Bonds and all other instruments, whether or not herein mentioned, as may be necessary or desirable in order to carry out the terms and provisions of this Resolution or the Bond Resolutions authorizing the Outstanding Bonds.

Section 5. If any provision of this Resolution or the application thereof to any circumstance shall be held to be invalid, the remainder of this Resolution and the application thereof to other circumstances shall nevertheless be valid, and this governing body hereby declares that this Resolution would have been enacted without such invalid provision.

Section 6. This Resolution shall take effect immediately upon its approval of the County Executive and the Clerk of the County Legislature.
